**Deer Island Rural Telephone.**

A number of the citizens of Deer Island got together at Artisan Hall last Monday afternoon for the purpose of organizing a rural telephone company, and as usual when they start anything in Deer Island they made a complete success of the matter. The following officers were elected: President, Edmond Olsen; Vice President, N. A. Anders; Secretary, H. C. Wood; Treasurer, J. F. Loyd; Directors, H. C. Gore, T. C. Mechan, Chas. Merrill. The company will start out with about twenty subscribers and the line will extend from the home of Fred Adams to the Canaan school house, covering a distance of about seven miles. Probably at some time in the future the line will be connected with the St. Helens system, and this part of the country brought in close touch. The central will be located at Deer Island and connected with the long distance wires.

**Large Real Estate Deal.**

One of the largest real estate deals consummated in recent years in Columbia county was made by the Crouse Realty Company, composed of H. C. Wilkoff and E. A. Crouse. They sold the Louis Sauser dairy ranch near Scappoose, consisting of 337 acres of fine land, 53 head of cattle and 5 head of horses, to a Mr. E. A. Page, of California. **Home Talent Play Makes Hit.**

"Tony, the Convict," was played at Watts & Price's Hall in Scappoose last Friday night and made a big hit. The play was under the auspices of the United Artisans and the troupe made up of local people. Considerable talent was shown in the acting and all who attended voted it a complete success.

**An Awful Slaughter.**

When Red Rupert's bunch and the St. Helens ball players get together there must be a jinks on the job somewhere. Last summer Red's aggregation came here and were licked 16 to 4, and they made 23 errors. The performance was equalled last Sunday, when the Red men came down again and took revenge, doing up St. Helens by the score of 24 to 2. What do you think of that? The ball team of the live wire class in the Sunday school would have found the St. Helens boys the easiest kind of picking. The visitors secured just 18 hits and the locals made 13 errors. Jasman, Brakke, Austin and Phil Nadeau did the throwing and the way the Portland boys pounded the ball around the lot was a caution. The one redeeming feature of the work of the St. Helens bunch was the way Pembroke filled his position. He was on the job all of the time and made both of the St. Helens tallies, one of them being a home run over left field fence.

**This District's Road Work.**

Columbia street between St. Helens and Cowlitz is all graded and rocked for a width of 24 feet in the center, which is all that the road district was figuring on doing. But now the property owners along the street have decided that they cannot afford to let the chance go by to have the whole street macadamized at a low figure and Road Supervisor DSpain is engaged in rocking it from curb to curb. This work is the cheapest work of the kind that was ever done in the city. The rock being put on is costing the property owners just about half what it would to buy it and put it on themselves. The crusher will run at this place until about the first of next month when the supervisor and his crew will go to the Yankton neighborhood and begin the work of getting the roads out that way ready for rocking. About the first of July the crusher will be set up near the bridge across Milton Creek near the Yankton postoffice. Work is also going on on the road from Houlton to Gilmore Crossing. This road when completed will be a monument to the progressive spirit of the people of Houlton. They needed the road and saw that it would bring trade to their merchants and so the city government is paying one-half of the cost of it. The contract for furnishing the wood for the crusher at Yankton was awarded to Mr. Wm. Skuzie of Bachelor Flat, the price to be \$1.78 for a rick of 2-foot wood and \$1.35 for 18-inch wood.

**PROCLAMATION.**

Whereas, under the initiative ordinance of the City of St. Helens, there was submitted to the people of said city at the general election, held therein on the 3rd day of April, 1911, an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to prohibit horses, cattle, sheep and hogs from running at large in the City of St. Helens; providing for the taking up of same and prescribing a penalty for the violation thereof," which said ordinance was regularly placed upon the ballot under the initiative ordinance of said City, and was voted upon by the legal voters in said city on the said 3rd day of April, 1911, That on the 5th day of April, 1911, the Common Council of the City of St. Helens met in regular session and canvassed the returns of said election and determined as follows; that there were one hundred and fifty seven votes cast on said ordinance; that there were ninety nine votes cast in favor of the adoption of said ordinance and fifty-eight votes cast opposing the adoption thereof.

Therefore by virtue of the authority in me vested, and under the direction of the City Charter of the City of St. Helens, I hereby declare and proclaim said ordinance to be in full force and effect from and after this date. Dated this 6th day of April, 1911. M. E. MILLER, Mayor.
