RAINIER ITEMS.

Rainier, Oregon, April 26, 1911.

The finest concert and ball ever given in Rainier was given under the auspices of the Bon Temps Dancing Club of this city. P. A. Campbell's Band of Portland, consisting of twenty pieces, furnished the music. An excellent musical program was given. After the concert dancing began. At midnight a fine lunch was served, and then dancing was resumed until the full program and a number of extras were danced. Campbell's Band is the best that ever visited this city and any time Mr. Campbell wants anything from Rainier he only needs ask for it. Forty couples graced the floor, and the costumes worn by the ladies will compare favorably with any seen in the more pretentious cities.

Kalama came to Rainier this afternoon with two boatloads of rosters, and when they lined up five of Nick Williams' Pippins were among them. Joe Haggin and Shorty Thurston were the battery for Rainier, with a nice little sore arm each. Haggin gave six men bases on balls, while Thurston made no attempt to throw to second. Gates went into the box for Kalama with Kirby behind the bat. Kirby certainly can throw to second; the ball goes down like a bullet. Gates blew up in the second and gave Rainier her first three runs. Kalama made her first two runs in the third inning. Gates was then replaced by Berger who gave Rainier three runs in the third inning, after that Berger settled down and there was nothing doing on either side until the seventh inning, when each team annexed a run. In the ninth inning Kalama made one spasmodic effort but only one run crossed the plate, the score standing 4 to 7 in favor of Rainier. Had Berger been put in on the start and warmed up properly before the game, there might have been a different story, but luck was with the fat manager and he stowed away another victory.

The new concrete bridge, which is being built across Nice Creek in this city, is being rushed by the contractors, who expect to have it finished within sixty days from now.

Jos. Lumjarvi, of Quincy, was a caller at the Mist office last Wednesday. Mr. Lumjarvi informs us that the Farmers' Co-operative Mercantile Co., Inc., is about ready to commence doing business, and will open their store sometime next month.

SHIPPING NEWS

The past week has been a good one along the water front and the lumber shipments from this port have been unusually heavy. Seven steam ships have taken on full or partial loads, and others are still arriving.

On Friday last the big British tramp Inverkip finished loading and left with a full cargo, 2,000,000 of which was taken on here, for Fremantle, Australia. The Inverkip is one of the biggest boats that ever touched here and looked good tied up at our docks. The same day that the Inverkip left the Steam Schooner Klamath of the McCormick line cleared with a 1,000,000 of lumber and sixty passengers for San Francisco.

The Temple E. Dorr was the next to load, leaving here Saturday with 650,000 for San Francisco, and on Tuesday last the Shoshone cleared with another cargo of 650,000. Thursday the Yosemite left with 850,000 and a full passenger list, and tonight the Casco is due to depart with about 550,000. The Shoshone, Yosemite and Casco will go to San Pedro, California. The Steamer Johan Poulson called Wednesday for about 100,000 feet of lumber.

This is a big week's business for a small town and the amount paid the longshoremen for loading these several boats is in the neighborhood of \$1800. The boats also buy a considerable amount of supplies from the local merchants, besides the amount of money spent here by the officers and crews.

The taking on of the passengers for the boats of the McCormick Line at this place instead of at Portland will prove to be a considerable advertisement for the town, as in the course of a few years there will be a large number of people call here who would not otherwise know there was such a place in existence as St. Helens. The papers daily contain reports of the poor condition of the lumber market, but it has not become noticeable at this place. From all local indications it would seem to be improving every day.
