**ESCAPES RE-TAKEN**

**Sheriffs Thompson and Burns Pick Up Men Who Broke Out of Clatsop Co. Jail.**

Sheriff Thompson of Columbia county and Sheriff Burns of Clatsop county met at Clatskanie last Saturday for the purpose of running down three prisoners who had escaped from the Clatsop county jail. The escaped men had headed toward Hillsboro through the Nehalem valley, and a farmer from below Jewell carried the word to the Clatsop county authorities that he had seen them. The two officers went into the valley and got track of their men immediately and easily effected the capture of two of them, but one was stronger than the others and had left his companions and has not yet been heard from. The two captured were returned to the Clatsop county jail. The county down the river should have a strong box like the one at this place and such things as escaped prisoners will be entirely unknown.

The following from the Astorian tells of how the men effected their getaway: They broke their way through the 3 1/2 inch cement floor of the Clatsop county jail to the space below the floor and then tunneled their way through 15 feet of mixed stone and earth and made their escape from the jail.

The men who made their escape were Harry Clifford, charged with obtaining money under false pretence; Junior Thompson, charged with larceny, and Emil Lance, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, and all had been bound over to the grand jury from the justice court.

The escape was well planned, and it is thought they were several days engaged in cutting their way through the cement floor to the open space underneath the jail. In the south side of the corridor of the jail which they were permitted to use, as none of the prisoners were accused of very serious crimes, is a small tub where the men wash their clothes, and it is thought they worked for at least two days in breaking through the cement floor and placed the tub over the hole to hide it from the notice of Jailer Spicer. This supposition is further born out by the fact that people who live near the jail heard a tapping sound when they passed the prison but thought nothing of it. If they were engaged in this work during the early hours of the morning, it is a mystery how they were able to conduct the tunnelling without attracting the attention of the jailer.

At 2:30 the morning of the escape, Jailer Spicer called into the corridor to quiet an insane prisoner locked in a separate cell and at that time nothing was found out of place. When he again visited the corridor at seven in the morning, he found only A. J. Burham, a Greek accused of a statutory crime, in the corridor, he having refused to escape with the other three prisoners.

Sheriff Burns was immediately notified of the escape and after making an inspection of the hole through which the prisoners got away, departed for Svenson, from where he worked his way back to Astoria but found no trace of the fugitives. Jailer Spicer departed for Olney, making inquiries along the roads but could secure no news of the whereabouts of the three men.

The police officials in all of the surrounding towns were notified by wire to be on the lookout and arrest any suspicious men who answered the description of the jailbreakers.

Where the men secured the instruments with which to bore through the cement floor is a mystery, but it is thought that Thompson, who on account of his exemplary conduct had been made a trusty, must have secured the needed instruments.

**ORDINANCE NO. —**  
An Ordinance providing for the disposition of Garbage in the City of Helens. The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That all householders residing within the limits of the City of St. Helens shall supply themselves with some receptacle for the purpose of depositing any and all garbage, cans, etc., which may accumulate in or about their several premises, and at least once each week the same shall be hauled away and burned under the direction and at the expense of the city.

Sec. 2. There is hereby designated as a crematory or place where any and all such garbage shall be burned by the City—that portion of Wyeth street on the North side of "Nigger Creek" and near the intersection of Casenau street.

Sec. 3. One day of each week shall be designated by the Council for the gathering of all garbage from the different and several residences in the city and on this day there shall be furnished by the City a wagon or cart to gather up such garbage, and it shall be the duty of each household to have the refuse and garbage at their respective houses ready for such delivery.

Sec. 4. If any person or persons in charge of any house or building shall fail or refuse to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance or shall allow any refuse or garbage to accumulate on his or their premises or about same, shall upon conviction thereof before the Recorder be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined in any sum less than \$25.00 for each offense.

Sec. 5. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply with like force and effect to any business house and to the owner or keeper thereof.

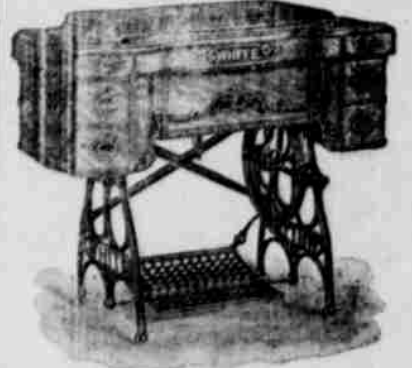
