

**Notice of Intention to Apply for Liquor License.**

To all persons concerned and the legal voters now residing in Scappoose precinct, Columbia County, State of Oregon, in particular, you and each of you will take notice that on the 7th day of June, 1911, G. B. Milroy will apply to the Honorable County Court of Columbia County, State of Oregon, for a license to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and fermented cider in less quantities than one gallon in Scappoose precinct, Columbia County, State of Oregon, for a period of one year, which application will be based upon the following:

That I am a resident and legal voter in Scappoose precinct, County of Columbia, State of Oregon, and that I have been a resident and legal voter in said precinct for more than thirty days prior to the date on which I have signed this petition.

**Death of Miss Alicia Lewis.**

Miss Alicia Lewis died at the home of her niece, Mrs. C. H. Johns, last Saturday, the 29th day of April, aged 81 years, three months and seven days. There was no immediate cause for her death, as it was due to the wearing out of the body which must come with age and up until a few days of the time when she passed away she was able to be about and take a short daily walk. She was buried at the cemetery in Rainier on Sunday, the M. E. minister of that place conducting the services. Miss Lewis was born in Ireland on the 22nd of January, 1830 and came direct from there to St. Helens in 1880, where she made her home with her sister, Mrs. A. L. Richardson, moving from here to Rainier, where she lived for about twenty five years, returning to this city about a year ago. No relatives are known in the old country. Mrs. W. G. Muckle and Mrs. C. H. Johns, of this city are nieces of the deceased, and Tom Richardson, of Seattle, and John Richardson, of San Francisco, are her nephews.

The figures for the cost of macadamizing the part of Columbia St. between St. Helens and Cowlitz will be a surprise to those who know anything about what rock usually costs. One thousand and forty yards of rock were used and the district paid about \$400 and the amount assessed to the property owners was \$405.45, making a total of \$805.45, or 77 cents a yard for the crushed rock put on the street and rolled down. In most towns if they could get this kind of work done for that they would be macadamizing the back yards and alleys. There is a probability that the work just done will be offed and if so, good as it now is, it will be a lot better.
