## THIS COUNTY'S BASEBALL

Accounts of the Games Played Throughout Columbia County. Send the Mist Your Game.

Maygar came up last Sunday and furnished a little entertainment for the fans and ball players of this place, but there was really very little doing in the line of really good baseball. Nadeau, Pembroke, Perry Austin and Earl Perry were all missing from the local line up, and from the tales that we had heard of the fast Maygar team there was a general feeling that the chances for the local nine getting trimmed were very good, and the game started as though the expectations of the pessimists were to be realized. The visitors gathered in six hits in the first inning and put three men across the plate, and we want to say right here that the St. Helens bunch was not until the St. Helens' ball came to the bat on the second that the balloon really went up, and the locals gathered in six runs, from then on the game was all to the good for the boys, and though the visitors kept on scoring now and then, there was really no danger of their catching up.

Past or sensational plays were utterly lacking, and the team showed that they missed the boys that were away. Everybody hit the ball and it was due altogether to the slugging that the bunch of runs we had were secured. When everything had been counted up it stood 11 to 9 in favor of the locals.

Morton was on the receiving end and held Stevens up in good shape. The work of the rest of the team was below what the fans look for, as the infield and outfield were both broken up, Ballagh playing first, both second, Brakke, going to short, and a new man by the name of Chanless going to third.

Cloninger, Owens and Flagg played in the outfield, and were thankful that there were few fly balls, and that big Sam got those few.

Look out for the game next Sunday as it will be the one so far. The baseball weather is due here now, and the crowds at the games should be large.

Lafferty's Loo Loos went to Warren last Sunday and gave the natives of that place a run for their money and came back with a tale of woe about the umpire etc., and there was no doubt in the boys

minds but that if they get another crack at the Warren bunch they will take them into camp in good shape. The final score was 12 to 11, but would have been much less had the ground been in decent shape. Watters was on the mound for St. Helens, with Robinson catching, which gives the boys a good battery. Lafferty plays first, Richardson short, and Robinson Jr. was at the third sack while one of the Thorpe boys held down second. The second team is now practicing regularly, and will take on the first aggregation in a short time.

**Rainier vs. Clatskanie.**  
 The Rainier team invaded Clatskanie Sunday, returning with the short end of a 5 to 4 score. Haggin, who pitched for the Ludians' held his old team mates to 7 scattered hits, while Winterbotham who pitched for Rainier was found for 12 safe ones, some of which were very scratchy. Blackford was the star at bat getting two singles and two doubles out of five times up, and driving in four of the five runs his team mates scored. McDonald was there with the stick, getting a single, a double, and two neat sacrifice hits, while Kapell had two singles.

Rainier scored two in the first on two bases on balls, a wild pitch, a sacrifice and an error in left field. They made two more in the third, a double a single, a sacrifice, two bases on balls, a stolen base, a passed ball, and an error being used in getting them.

Clatskanie counted in the fifth when three singles and three stolen bases produced one lone tally. In the eighth they touched off the fireworks when two singles, a base on balls, an error, and two stolen bases were followed by a long double which scored four runs and won the game.
