ST. HELENS WINS ANOTHER

The Linton sawdust shovelers came down here last Sunday to beat the local baseball players and there was something doing in the way of fattening up batting averages. As far as baseball is concerned there was very little of that and the runs that they got were mostly presents, while all the local boys had to do was walk up to the plate and lambaste the offerings of a long connected Vancouverite to the fence.

But then they came down here feeling hopeful, and when the first man up a sawed off named Penny, came up and got a home run there was nothing to it from a Linton stand point, even though the next three were easy in the order that they came to bat. St. Helens came back at them by gathering in three. Mr. Ballagh lead off and walked. Laws came up and bunted, and Mr. Thompson threw the ball away. Somebody found it and threw it away again. That hunt turned out to be a home run and both Ballagh and Laws tallied. With two down in the same inning Owens hit for two bases and scored on a single by Gleason. Brough got on by being hit in the middle the next man struck out.

The second chapter passed without disaster on either side, but the third was another story of disaster for the boys who live near the big oil tanks. Stevens started with a smash for two stations, and Brakke hit safely, and stole second. Owens cleaned the bases with a two bagger, Gleason struck out, and Brough sacrificed, advancing Owens to third. Campbell lined out a single that scored Owens.

The fourth resembled the third in that there were three more runs chased across the plate for the locals. In the seventh and eighth nine more runs were placed to the credit of St. Helens, and at the finish the score was 18 to 5.

OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., June 12 (Special)—That this will be the biggest year Oregon has ever known, with the biggest crop total in its history, is the prediction made by Dr. James Withycomb, director of the United States Experiment Station at Corvallis. He estimates that the total value of Oregon crops for 1911 will be more than \$125,000,000.

Loggers of the Columbia River Basin will go to Vancouver, B. C., to attend the third annual Logging Congress, to be held there June 22-23. The conditions that obtain in this industry will be discussed thoroughly and all matters of interest to timbermen will be taken up. It is expected this will be one of the most important meetings ever held in the history of Northwest logging and there promises to be a large attendance.

Tillamook will celebrate the opening of its railroad from that city to a point in the Nehalem Valley near Wheeler on July 1st. This road will probably be opened between Portland and Tillamook in the fall.

German-speaking societies of this city have raised a fund to be used in connection with a sum provided by the Commercial Club to be expended in attracting German immigration to Oregon. It is planned to devote the money to the publication of German booklets, telling of the advantages Oregon offers to the settler and in answering letters of inquiry in the German language.

Oregon's newly formed Naval Reserve will have a flagship before the end of the month for the United States Cruiser Boston has been ordered transferred to duty at Portland and will be brought here during the coming week by the officers of this organization. It will thereafter be the headquarters of the Reserve and will participate in practice cruises to train the men in naval maneuvers.

Postmasters of the state, who were in convention at Portland during the past week, endorsed the postal saving bank system and urged its extension throughout Oregon. Postmasters where these institutions have been tried were earnest advocates for them elsewhere. Next June, postmasters of Oregon and Washington will meet in Portland.

Portland now claims to have the fastest motor boat in the world, the Oregon Wolf having just been launched, and it made its first appearance at races run during the Rose Festival. This craft was built solely for speed purposes and it is expected to race her throughout the country. She runs at the rate of 51 miles an hour.

Bankers of the state have been in session in Portland the past week, and they say never before has banking been in such a satisfactory condition in Oregon. The report of President Martin declared there was more railroad building last year than ever before and prospects for
