FOUND—On Deer Island sand bar one gasoline boat named Red Devil, owner will find same at Connels Landing, Mr. A. TRACY.

Roy Craig, the popular young barber of this place, and George Shysman are the original life savers. The following appeared in the Oregonian on last Tuesday: "George Shysman and Roy Craig saved three foreigners from drowning in the Columbia River here early this morning, after the trio had overturned their boat in a drunken attempt to row across the river. The men rescued were gill net fishermen. Though it was not yet daylight Shysman and Craig put out to the capsized men's aid in response to their cries, in a row boat. The men were clinging to the overturned boat and in the darkness, Shysman, who was the only one able to swim, leaped from the boat and attached a line to the capsized craft. One of the trio who became exhausted loosed his hold on the boat and was carried down stream. Shysman swam after him and pulled him ashore, while Craig towed the upset boat with the two men clinging to it to the landing."

The facts of the matter are as follows: The two boys went down to the dock at about twelve o'clock Saturday night, and found two fishermen sitting there, talking about their two friends who were in the water. The boys got busy at once, lit a lantern that the men on the dock had, and found that in getting into their skiff the men had turned it over, and though both were holding onto it, they were in grave danger of drowning. One of them could be reached from the slip and was pulled out, while the other, who was holding to the stern of the boat, was about all in, and Shysman climbed along one of the stringers, and stood on the upturned boat while he passed a line around the fisherman. He was then pulled to safety. Craig's picture accompanied the article in the Oregonian.

SOME BALL GAME

The ball game of the season was undoubtedly the one played on the Rainier grounds last Thursday, when the business men of this city and Rainier went to the mat. The local line left here at about 12:30 on the eventful day and on board the Klamath, Jr., with Capt'n Blakesley in charge. The business houses of Rainier all closed to celebrate and when the game started despite the mosquitoes, there was a goodly crowd in the bleachers and grandstand, though most of them had fir boughs to keep away the winged pirates.

C. W. Hodson of Portland who recently returned from an extended trip through the Eastern States, in an interview in the Portland Telegram, has the following to say regarding the results of the extensive advertising Oregon and particularly Portland, have been doing since the Lewis and Clark Fair.

Dayton and Pittsburg requested me to deliver my talk among other places, but time did not permit. I was astonished at the amount of information that Easterners have about this city and state.

"There appeared no limit to the amount of data the Easterners wanted about Portland. Formerly they have been talking Seattle, but now it is all Portland and they all know more about this place. Business men, particularly, have watched the progress of the city as evidenced through the building permits and bank clearances and consider this the most thriving city in the United States.

Every day evidences of the fact that this advertising campaign has been far reaching in its scope and immensely beneficial to the state in general, is becoming more apparent to the close observer of the progress and phenomenal development of the northwest.

That the development of Ore. has suffered in the past through a lack of proper advertising is a fact which cannot be denied. However the results being obtained, and the benefits being derived from the recently started advertising campaign should act as a stimulus to further efforts on the part of the different commercial bodies throughout the state.

We have seen the phenomenal growth of our neighboring state resulting from the policies of exploitation inaugurated by that great empire builder, Jas. J. Hill and carried out by the progressive commercial bodies of that state to such an extent as to arouse the admiration of all. That the state of Oregon possesses undeveloped resources second to no other state in the northwest is a fact that cannot be denied. To follow up the work already started should be the object and earnest endeavor of every citizen of the state.

Elmore C. Jordan, a locomotive engineer on the Los Angeles division of the Southern Pacific Company, has recently received a patent on a new device for the filling of lubricators upon locomotives by means of compressed air. The device is extremely simple and provides a means by which the central reservoir of the lubricator can be filled at any time while the engine is hot, and without any waste of lubricating oil or any danger to the operator from leaking valves, an arrangement greatly appreciated by the engineers on the long, straight-away runs on the Southern Pacific. At the time Jordan completed his invention he brought it to the attention of the Southern Pacific officials and through them patent letters were granted. It was experimented with upon the huge Mallet locomotives of the Southern Pacific Company and later pronounced practically a necessity on account of the location of the lubricators on these engines, since these lubricators are so high on the boiler head and difficult to fill.

With Jordan's invention the lubricators can be filled while the engine is in motion without taking the usual necessary time to cool the lubricator. It is being used on all locomotives of the Harriman Lines and will undoubtedly soon be taken up by many other railroads.
