The Panama-Pacific Exposition

The site which the directors of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Company have selected for the exposition grounds in 1915 is described as follows:

Commencing at Telegraph Hill and by means of a boulevard along the bay front connecting, in turn, with the Harbor View site, the Presidio, Lincoln Park and Golden Gate Park. The length of the proposed boulevard is estimated at between eight and nine miles.

These various sections of the site will be connected also by an intermaral railroad, which, according to present plans, will run along the south sides of Harbor View and the Presidio and then break off, skirting Lincoln Park and running through Richmond district to Golden Gate Park.

The various features of the exposition grounds will be distributed as follows, according to the tentative plans under consideration:

HARBOR VIEWS

Of the territory bounded by Fort Mason, Lombard street, the Presidio and the bay front it is proposed to utilize between 250 and 300 acres. Here will be located such heavy exhibits as the transportation locomotive machinery and perhaps, the manufacturers' building; also the concessions and other features that will constitute the night life of the exposition. It is not proposed to do any building in at the water front, but to construct there a yacht harbor, an aquatic park and water front features of the exposition. An aquarium is suggested for the present site of the Fulton Iron Works.

THE PRESIDIO

It is expected that the United States Government will erect here its Government buildings and exhibits, which, it is suggested, could be afterward used for division headquarters.

LINCOLN PARK

Lincoln Park is to be devoted to scenic features, and for that purpose improved and beautified. A giant commemorative statue at the summit, commanding the entrance to the harbor, is contemplated. Picturesque cafes and gardens are to be located here.

Connecting Lincoln Park with Golden Gate Park it is proposed to utilize some 200 acres of land in the Richmond district. Here will be located the foreign, State and counties' buildings and the horticultural, electrical and other exhibits.

GOLDEN GATE PARK

Golden Gate Park is reserved for the construction of only permanent features that are calculated to add to its attractiveness without destroying any of its natural beauty. Here are to be located the museum and art gallery, also Japanese and Chinese gardens, fountains and statuary. It is proposed to make the stadium the finest in the world and to build a Coliseum around it. Another feature will be a miniature Panama canal connecting the lakes. Only the section west of Twentieth avenue is to be used for exposition purposes.

TELEGRAPH HILL

It is proposed to commemorate the use to which Telegraph Hill was put in early days by erecting thereon a large wireless Telegraph station. The hill is to be terraced and a permanent observatory erected on the city park.

OTHER FEATURES

The ferry at the foot of Market street is to be made the entrance to exposition city. There will be a grand court and, possibly, viaducts to conduct passengers from either side of Market street. Market street to be improved and beautified with electric light features; also Van Ness Avenue. An auditorium or convention hall is designed for Van Ness avenue at Market street.

The main entrance to the exposition grounds will be located near Fort Mason with others at Lincoln and Golden Gate Parks.

Blocks 14 & 15 on North side of Nigger Creek will be placed on the market by J. B. Godfrey, building restrictions will be placed at \$1200, and 15 feet from the street line. For lots in these blocks see J. B. Godfrey or Geo. H. Shinn.

Use For Sour Milk

It is now pretty generally believed that sour milk has certain medicinal qualities not possessed by sweet milk. The lactic acid organisms which it contains seem to act as purifiers and disinfectants. It is therapeutic as well as nourishing, and, according to a certain authority, promotes a healthy old age and long life.

The fact that Mr. Mortensen, head of the dairy department of the Iowa agricultural experiment station, has recently developed a new sour milk food in the shape of lactic acid ice cream is of interest, therefore, to the hygienists as to the confectioners and soda fountain folks. It is made just as is ordinary ice cream except that sour milk is substituted for sweet milk. According to the inventors lactic acid ice cream is very palatable and possesses a certain piquant twang which renders it peculiarly grateful in hot weather. They see "no reason why 'lacto' should not, within a reasonable time, become just as popular as sherbet.

With its last issue the Polk County Observer, published at Dallas, passed out of the hands of J. C. Hayter, the pioneer newspaper man of that section. Mr. Hayter was an old friend of the former editor of the Mist, and has made a mark in his field in the progressive Willamette Valley. Eugene Foster and W. H. Totten are the new proprietors.

So far this year there have been issued from the office of County Clerk La Bare 308 hunting licenses and 397 anglers. Of course there will be some more before the end of the year, but it seems as though there were more people that who go fishing and hunting once in a while. If you have no license do not break the law hunting or fishing until you get one; for they only cost a dollar each, and the risk of being arrested is not worth running.

Louis Wilde, the alleged embezzler, will be brought to Oregon from California for trial. The allegation is that W. Cooper Morris and Wild charged the defunct Oregon Trust and Savings bank \$90,000 on a telephone bond deal, "splitting" the commission and taking \$45,000 each. Morris was an officer of the bank, being its cashier, and he was convicted and is serving a term in the penitentiary. The legal question that will likely be involved will be as to whether the commission alleged to have been paid to Wild was legitimate, since he was not an executive officer of the bank. The contention of the prosecution is that he was equally guilty with Morris.

The county court is now in session at this place, and are working today on road matters. The balance due Ledoux, Ledoux & Ehrman on the construction of the bridge across Nice Creek was ordered paid, and less the 5 per cent to be held for 60 days amounted to \$2842. The petition of the Clatskanie Commercial Club for the opening of the Rainier-Clatskanie road was considered and the Portland Lumber Co. ordered to open within 30 days.
