Playing the game for all there was in it, the best little home guard team on the river went down to defeat for the third time before the heavy batting of the St. Helens team in this city last Sunday. The Clatskanie rooters, (to say nothing of the "rooters") went wild in the first inning when Clatskanie made the first run of the game, after J. Bryant fanned, Uksela was safe on a hot one to Brakke, stole second, took third on a passed ball, and scored on R. Bryants out, Laws to Austin. Haggin fanned. The first was unproductive for St. Helens.

In the second the 'victors annexed another, Haggin was out on first, Elliott hit safe, Pelto sacrificed, and Elliott scored on Blackford's two base hit. Popham fanned.

Nadeau flied out, Stevens drew a two bagger to right field and took third on Owens sacrifice, Ballagh walked and stole second, Stevens scored on an error by Pelto of Serr's hot grounder, Porth hit through second scoring Ballagh and Serr. Porth scored the third run of this inning on a passed ball. Three hits and an error by Stevens gave Clatskanie one run in the third tying the score.

The third and fourth were uneventful for St. Helens as was the fourth and fifth for Clatskanie.

St. Helens again took the lead in the fifth, Serr was out Pelto to J. Bryant, Porth hit safe but was forced at second by Austin who scored on Laws two bagger to right field, Brakke was out Uksela to J. Bryant.

THE COMMON DRINKING CUP

The filthy common drinking cup is now under a ban of the state. The law prohibiting the common drinking cup on all railroad trains, in railroad stations, in the public and private schools, in all the educational institutions of the State of Oregon, went into effect on Sept. 1, 1911.

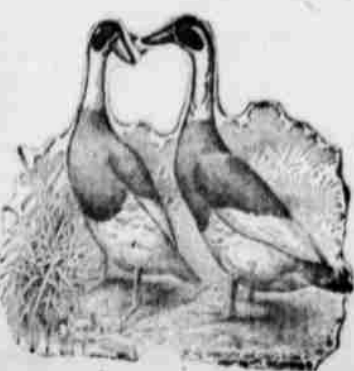
