John Gage furnished a fine exhibit of garden products. John Saxton of Bachelor Flat sent some fine apples and pears of different varieties. Some very fine potatoes from Messrs Bumgardner and Reenick. Wheat and oats from Kelvin Grove Farm, Ernest Rylander, H. Southard, Charles Muckle and John Saxton. Mr. A. C. Holaday will ship several varieties of apples from his excellent fruit farm. H. J. Southard will furnish several varieties of apples from his farm.

V. L. Malcolm will ship products from the Clatskanie neighborhood. Caten Bros. will furnish some of the large vegetables that grow on Savies Island.

Most of the other sections of the county will be represented with products of the farm, but cannot furnish names at this date. All who possibly can should attend the State Fair as this is the best time to learn and see what the state produces.

LABOR DAY AT RAINIER

Labor Day was to have been a big day in Rainier and the prosperous little Columbia County town was the Mecca for people all along the line from Portland to Astoria. The Anderson-Edward fight for the Championship of the Northwest was to take place, and everyone knew that it would be a bloody good battle.

They came on every train despite the fact that Sheriff Thompson had announced that he would not allow the fight to go, and there was a couple of boat loads on hand from Vancouver. The Sheriff had been at Salem, and did not get into Portland until eight o'clock on Labor Day morning, which was too late for him to catch the first train to Rainier, so he telephoned to Deputy Lake, instructing him to go down and see that there was no fight. Lake caught the Lurline and it was a mighty sad crowd that he met down below. The fans in Portland were telephoned, but the boats had already left Vancouver, and it was too late to stop them, so they made the trip for the pleasure of the ride.

From the time that the Deputy Sheriff arrived in Rainier he was surrounded by an anxious crowd that tried to persuade him that prize fights were just the thing for the advancement of the community prosperity, and when one person was through talking another commenced. Edwards did not show up at all, as he was probably stopped by friends in Portland, and when Mr. Thompson arrived on the three o'clock train all that the promoters wanted was to have a couple of six round boxing bouts, which he allowed to be put on, as there is nothing in violation of the law in a boxing match.

The first one was between Fred Anderson and Chuck O'Connell, and was greatly enjoyed as young Anderson showed a lot of class and gave O'Connell, who is an old war horse that could eat him up in a fight, all that he could handle in a boxing match. The second go was between Bud Anderson, lightweight champion of the Northwest and Spike Morrissey, of Boston. Compared with Vancouver, where Anderson hails from, Boston must be a poor town for scrappers, for Morrissey, though he has met some of the good ones at different times, did not make any showing at all with Anderson, who is one of the fastest it has ever been our pleasure to see. In anticipation of a hard go with Edwards' he was trained down and in the pink of condition, and the things he could have done to Morrissey if the Sheriff had not been at the ringside are better imagined than told.

Peter Burzko and Hug Copple were scheduled to wrestle at the K. P. Hall in the evening, but the people of Rainier did not seem to care for the wrestling game, and there was not sufficient crowd to make it worth their while for the grapplers to go on.

Jack Depain came up from Goble this week to attend the session of county court. Mr. Depain is helping Road Supervisor Anliker in the crushing of rock for the Goble road and will be down the river with the crusher about three more weeks. All told, there will be some 2000 yards of rock crushed before the machine is moved back to this place, most of which goes on the Shilo Basin road. The place where the machine is working at Goble is convenient and the amount of rock crushed has been up to the average, and one day last week 107 yards was put through in eight hours, which is a record run. Mr. Depain has been objecting to the court to the proposition of this district keeping up the repairs on the crusher. It is moved around to different places, and while it breaks down while in actual operation in a place that district must repair it, still an example of the injustice to this district is to be found in the trip to Goble. A short time before going down a new set of eccentrics was purchased for the crusher for \$73, and by the time the run at Goble is completed these eccentrics will have to be replaced. It seems as though it would be a good idea for the up keep of the tools, which were purchased by the general fund, to come out of the same fund.

The new coasting steamer of the Mc Cornick Line will be launched to day and will soon be making regular trips between St. Helens and San Francisco. The new boat will be called the Willamette, and will carry nearly a million feet of lumber and about sixty passengers. She will make her first trip about the first of December.
