### ST Helens Mill won't Close

### New Steamer to be Built

Herbert Holman, the president and manager of the America Transportation Company, which operates

the Steamer America between St. Helens and Portland, has let a contract for the building of a new boat to take the place of the America. The new boat will be called the America and will ply between St. Helens and Portland through the Willamette Slough. It will be considerably larger than the present boat and will have accommodations for about 100 passengers and have a speed of about 17 miles an hour. Work on her will be started about the first of the year and will be completed during the early spring.
