Notes from O. A. C.

State Horticultural Commissioner A. J. Cook of California has written Dean A. B. Cordley of the Oregon Agricultural College making him to recommend two men for assistants in the commission. One is to act in the insectary as assistant, with a salary of \$1,800 a year, the other as field deputy at the same salary with expenses, traveling through Mexico, Tahito, and like districts, collecting and breeding predacious and parasitic insects for economic studies.

The current number of the Oregon Countryman, a monthly magazine issued by the Oregon Agricultural College, contains an unusual amount of interesting information, fifteen special articles being furnished, all but two of the authors being students. The leading article, on "Suggestions on Live Stock Classifications For County Fairs," is by G. R. Samson of the animal husbandry department, and one on the Kansas State Agricultural College department of home economics is by Mrs. H. B. Brooks, professor of domestic art. An Ayrshire cow from the herd at the Oregon Agricultural College was sacrificed to science last week, being used in a post mortem examination before the students. She had reacted from the tuberculin test some time ago, but because of her phenomenal yield had been retained, in quarantine under the Bang system, in the hope that she might produce a valuable calf. When the calf proved to be sickly, it was decided that the cow was no longer successful except for demonstration. Dr. W. S. McAllister, a Corvallis veterinarian and Prof. E. L. Potter, with G. R. Samson, showed the students the effects of the tubercule bacillus on the various tissues and organs.
