In central and northern California, where oaks are deciduous, the maples thrive and no objection should be made to use of street and highway.

"Robert, love, have you saved that thousand yet?"

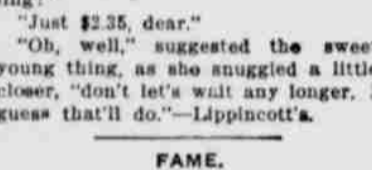
"Why no, my love," he replied, "not at all."

## DYNAMITERS AT ANARCHIST HOME

### Colony of "Freethinkers" Near Tacoma Harbored Plotters

Attempted to Purchase High Explosives at Company Store—Editor of "Agitator" Knew Men.

Tacoma, Wash. — Disclosures made public here have revealed the fact that Home colony, a settlement of "free thinkers" on Joe's bay, less than 20 miles from Tacoma, Wash., was for several months prior to the night the Los Angeles Times building was dynamited, the dwelling place of M. A. Schmidt and David Caplan, that James B. McNamara visited there, and that for nearly 12 months Caplan and his friends were under the eye of William J. Burns.

Jay Fox, editor of the "Agitator," an anarchistic periodical, is known to have been a close friend of Caplan, and J. M. Tillman, a Burns detective who formerly was a deputy sheriff with supervision over the Home colony, and Oscar Engvall, formerly manager of the co-operative store at Home, declare that Caplan and Fox attempted to buy high power dynamite in the fall of 1910. Engvall said that he was dismissed from the colony because he refused to provide the explosive.

### CAR RUNS AWAY.

In Mad Race Conductor's Nerve Proves Him Hero.

Vancouver, B. C.—An interurban trolley-car, bound from Vancouver to New Westminster, ran away for four miles down a steep grade but the conductor locked the 20 passengers in and the car stuck to the track, so that all survived the terrible ride.

Motorman Hayes sought to apply the brakes and discovered that the bolt had dropped out of the brake beam and that he had no control whatever over the car. Conductor Batten immediately locked the doors and informed the passengers that the car was out of control, but would come to a stop across the bridge on Lulu island.

Several of the frightened passengers tried to break through the windows, and one man attacked the conductor. He was subdued, however, and Batten kept the passengers under control.

A perilous curve beyond Eburne was passed safely, and after a mile and a half along the level grade of Lulu island the car stopped and the passengers disembarked.

In a similar runaway two years ago 18 persons were killed.

### GREAT ACREAGE RESTORED.

Oregon Regains for Public Entry Tracts Previously Withdrawn.

Washington, D. C.—Secretary Fisher, in a report sent to congress, shows that in the last 12 months 15,974 acres of public land in Oregon were withdrawn to protect power sites, and 18,970 acres previously withdrawn for this purpose were restored to entry. Also, 104,123 acres, withdrawn to determine their coal content, have been restored to entry, it having been found that they contained no commercial coal.

In Washington 37,276 acres were withdrawn to protect power sites, while 1,457 acres of power-site withdrawals were restored to entry, in addition to 2,897 acres withdrawn for coal.

In the Snake river valley, Idaho, 5,179,155 acres of land, withdrawn on the presumption that it contained coal, has been restored to entry, no coal having been found.

### Salmon Pack Record New.

Seattle—The Puget Sound salmon pack for 1911 established a new record, a total of 1,625,000 cases having been packed according to figures compiled by Secretary Crawford of the Puget Sound Cannery's association. The pack was twice as large as the most optimistic packers expected and exceeded the record of 1909 by almost 50,000 cases. The value of the output is placed at \$8,125,000. The record breaking production is attributed to the heavy run of pink salmon, 1,052,261 cases of which were packed.

### \$600,000 in Gold Coming.

Seattle—The steamship Northwestern has arrived from Seward with \$600,000 of Iditarod gold in care of an express company. The gold came out by dog team from Iditarod to Seward. Among the passengers of the Northwestern were a dozen of the leading Iditarod operators and much of the gold belonged to them. More miners are on the way out to pass the winter "in the states," and more gold is also on the way.

### Big Supply House Plan.

San Francisco—Ground will be broken shortly in this city for a million-dollar marine supply department. The site has been selected and work is to be begun immediately. The building proper will cost \$200,000 and it will house stores valued at more than \$1,000,000. The early completion of the Panama canal and the resultant increase of war vessels in Pacific waters have made the establishment of a greater distributing center for the marine corps necessary on this coast.
