A Step Forward

During the past three or four years St. Helens has made rapid strides toward becoming a city. The population has increased from about 400 to 1400 or 1500. The payroll for laboring men has increased from \$10,000 per month to \$75,000 per month. Several streets have been graded and macadamized where a few years ago were stumps and rocks. Substantial business blocks and modern residences have taken the place of old time wooden structures and cottages. A magnificent stone Court House has replaced the old tumble down shack used for so many years by the county. A modern gravity water system furnishing enough pure mountain water to supply a city of 10,000 people is in perfect operation. A sewer system drains a portion of the city at present and steps are now being taken to extend the system to cover the entire city. An up-to-date telephone service and electric light system are furnishing the inhabitants with these modern necessities. Shipment of 60,000,000 feet of lumber from St.

Helens during 1911 makes it one of the important shipping ports of the great Columbia River. A beautiful and thoroughly up-to-date school building has just been completed sufficient to accommodate several hundred students and the district maintains a first class high school. Other and valuable improvements have been made and many others are now contemplated. On every hand progress and prosperity are apparent.
