The 36th quarterly session of the Columbia County Pomona Grange was held in Houlton, Saturday, the 3d inst.

New Method

Sheriff Thompson has adopted a new method of notifying the taxpayers of the amount due from each of them and will send out the receipts already made out showing the property taxed and the amount due. The taxpayer will thus be enabled to see just what property is assessed to him and the amount due so that if there has been no mistake in the description of the property or in computing the amount of tax it will only be necessary to return a remittance together with the receipt which will then be signed and returned. This will also enable the force at the office to take care of the work in about one-fourth the time that it takes to make out all the receipts as the taxpayers come in.

Notice Closing Streams

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That, WHEREAS, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners of the State of Oregon, the Board of Fish Commissioners of the State of Oregon and the United States Bureau of Fisheries have propagated and stocked, and are propagating and stocking the waters of the Willamette and Clackamas rivers, in the State of Oregon, with salmon fish; and

WHEREAS, said streams are frequented by salmon fish, and for the purpose of protecting the same, the said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners has decided to close the said Willamette river, and its tributaries, below and north of the falls thereof, at Oregon City, and all of the Clackamas river, and its tributaries, to prevent fishing therein, by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon fish, during the period of time hereinafter specified.

NOW THEREFORE NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that said Willamette river, and its tributaries, below and north of the falls thereof, at Oregon City, and all of said Clackamas river, and its tributaries, are and each of them is hereby closed to fishing, by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon fish between twelve o'clock noon, on the 1st day of March, 1912, and twelve o'clock noon on the 1st day of May, 1912; and it is and will be unlawful to fish for, or take, or catch any salmon fish by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling in any of said waters during the said period of time above specified.

Any and all persons whomsoever so fishing in violation of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.
