Scott and McDougall, specifications 1 and 2 and Ewing road for \$7132, and the court being advised it is ordered by the court that said bids be, and the same is hereby rejected.

It is further ordered by the court that said work as advertised be performed by the supervisor of said District No. 9, under the direction of the county court.

Matter of Petition of Summit Lumber Company for rebate of tax.

On this day the petition of Summit Lumber Company for rebate of tax on timber on S1-2 of Sw1-4 of Sec. 24, T-4, on account of said timber having been removed prior to the time for making assessment for year 1910, coming on regularly for re-consideration, and the court being advised in the premises, it is ordered by the court that the clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a warrant on the general fund in favor of Summit Lumber Company, in the sum of \$161.32.

Matter of Petition of J. A. Van, et al for a County Road.

On this 7th day of March, 1912 comes on for hearing the petition of J. A. Van, et al freeholders, residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road, described as follows:

Commencing at a stake marked "R" at the end of the Gravel Road at F. E. Malmberg place, about 40 rods northerly of the 1-4 stake between Sections 12 and 13, in Township six north of range five west of the Willamette Meridian, and running thence in a northerly direction on the east side of the hill, on the most practical route (not to exceed about six per cent grade) and to intersect the present county road at a stake marked "R," about 40 rods south of the John Hubeck place, or about 80 rods along the said county road in a southerly direction from the 6 mile stake on the

line of the present county road, making a distance of about 8600 feet in length.

And thereby vacating all that portion of the present county road covered by the above said survey, lying and being between said points of survey, when said road is complete and ready for travel.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the court from proof filed herein that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good sufficient bond has been given and filed herein.

It is therefore ordered by the court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of said proposed road on the 21st day of March, 1912, or on their failure to meet on said day then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

## City Ticket

A mass meeting of the voters of St. Helens was held at the City Hall last Monday night for the purpose of nominating a ticket for the election to be held on April 1st. About 100 voters were present and the contests for some of the offices were quite spirited.

Martin White was the only name proposed for Mayor and he was declared to be the unanimous choice for that office. For Councilmen there were several names proposed but when the count was completed it was found that Von A. Gray and Wilbur Muckle had the largest vote and they were declared to be the choice for Councilmen for two years. For Treasurer several ballots were necessary to name the choice, W. A. Harris finally winning out over L. R. Rutherford and R. S. Hattan. U. S. DSpain was the unanimous choice for Water Commissioner. After the voting for city officers was over there remained about 60 people and it was thought to be a good time to get the sentiment of the voters on choice for President so every man present was given a ballot and write thereon the name of his choice, whether democratic, republican or socialist; The vote stood Roosevelt, 29, Taft 15, LaFollette 5, Wilson 8, Clark 1, Bryan 3; other votes scattered between Debs, Berger, Chapin and a few local favorites.
