Roosevelt for President Selling Defeats Bourne L. Fluhrer,

Close Fight Between Fields Vessel Coming to and Olcott

Norblad Badly Defeated by Tongue

Woodrow Wilson Choice of Democrats

Primary election passed off very quietly in St. Helens and county although there are several precincts yet to hear from, For President, Theodore Roosevelt has carried the county by a majority, the vote in 10 precincts 458; Taft 202. For United States States Senator, Bourne received in the same 10 precincts, 216. Lowell 73; Morton 44; Selling 489. Fields for Sec. of State leads Olcott by a vote of 432 to 322. E. B. Tongue for District Attorney has 550 and Norblad 306. For Representative W. A.
