2 DEAD WHEN PLANK SNAPS

Sixty Boarding Flyer at Seattle are Plunged into Sea.

Seattle.—Two persons are known to have been drowned and 50 were injured when the adjustable end of a temporary passenger gangplank at the Colman Dock dropped, precipitating 60 passengers into the water as they were preparing to board the Puget Sound steamer Flyer, for Tacoma.

The dead: Mrs. G. V. Learned, Seattle. Carl Bruder, 1-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Bruder, of Seattle.

Most of the injured were only slightly bruised or cut by striking against piling and the hull of the Flyer when they fell into the water and all will recover.

Root at National Convention Halm

Chicago.—Senator Elihu Root, of New York, will be recommended as temporary chairman of the republican national convention. The announcement of his acceptance of the post was made by Harry New, chairman of the subcommittee on arrangements of the republican national committee.

Players' Strike is Called Off.

Philadelphia.—Because they did not want to see Frank Navin, president of the club, suffer for any action on their part, the players of the Detroit American League baseball club called off their strike and agreed to play the regular scheduled game in Washington, without the services of Tyrus Cobb.

RICHESON EXECUTED FOR GIRL'S MURDER

Boston.—Clarence V. T. Richeson was electrocuted at 12:17 (Eastern time) Monday morning. The current applied was 1500 volts, eight amperes. One application was sufficient.

Richeson walked to the electric chair erect, eyes straight ahead until he sat down. Then he closed his eyes and kept them shut until the end.

The execution of Clarence V. T. Richeson drew the curtain on a tragedy unsurpassed for cunning, cruelty and notoriety in the criminal annals of the United States. The minister, with his wedding announcement already in the hands of friends, and a discarded sweetheart importuning him to relieve her from a position that would cloud her life with shame, calmly conceived a plan that would release him from his unwelcome liason and deliberately purchased a quantity of cyanide of potassium, a deadly poison, and advised Miss Linnel to take it.

It was at first believed that she had committed suicide in a fit of despondency upon learning the news of Richeson's approaching marriage to Miss Edmonds.

It is expected the wishes of the dead man will be carried out and that he will be buried beside his mother in the family vault in Virginia.

GRANGE AGAINST SINGLE TAX

West's Road Bills are Also Fought and Order Will Support its Own.

Roseburg.—After wangling the greater part of one day over D'Ren's proposed single tax resolution, which was defeated, the state grange closed its labors Saturday.

The grange is opposed to Governor West's road plans and the Pacific Highway, is opposed to the consolidation of the state university and agricultural college; is in favor of equal suffrage; is in favor of building good roads by headlet, provided that homerule be applied in fixing the highways to be improved. The grange is also in favor of taking state institutions out of politics.

There were four days of active discussion by the grange. During the meeting each of the great problems before the people of the state was taken up and fully discussed.

Bull Run Guarded From Forest Fires

Portland.—Taking heed from the forest fire which started several days ago on Clear Creek, about 12 miles west of the summit of Mount Hood and destroyed much valuable timber and a number of the houses of settlers, arrangements have been made by the federal authorities and the city water department for a careful patrol of the borders of the Bull Run reserve for the protection of the watershed of the Portland water supply.

MORRIS MAY GET FREEDOM

Parole Board Asks That Portland Banker be Released.

Salem.—Whether W. Cooper Morris of Portland, convicted for embezzlement in connection with the failure of Oregon Savings & Trust company, receives a parole or not, is now for Governor West to say, for the parole board has recommended that he be paroled at the expiration of his minimum sentence which is May 24. This move was made quietly by the board and it came as a complete surprise as the board when the case came up several weeks ago declined to act favorably on the case, postponing it for several months.

The conditions of the parole for Morris, as recommended, are attached to the requirement that his friends produce a \$250 bond. The sole reason for this bond is to indemnify the state against any possible violation of the parole by Morris. The board believes that the \$250 would be sufficient to pay the expenses of returning him to the prison in case he proved recalcitrant to his trust.
