## County Official Paper

Political conditions are so badly complicated in the United States that the voter is at a loss to know just "where he is at." With three parties in the field in most of the states, two of them claiming to represent the great Republican principles, and with county and state tickets nominated by the Republicans before the great split occurred, many people are asking that state and county nominees of the Republican party announce whether they belong to the regular Republican party; or are followers of the Bull Moose. It is no more than fair that they do so. If they are entitled to the support of a party by the use of a party name and with all the prestige that gives to one, they should come out in the open and declare themselves. They are either Republicans or they are Bull Moosers. If they are followers of the great Bull Moose Leader they have no business on a Republican ticket. If they are Republicans and expect Republican support they should say so. The people are demanding this from all Republican nominees from the office of Coroner to United States Senator. The columns of the Mist are open for any announcement from any of the candidates.

There remains one great obstacle in the way of the building of factories in St. Helens which depend upon the railroads for transporting their goods. We have no terminal rates. If a flour mill, for instance, should decide to locate here it would be impossible for them to do so and successfully compete with Portland mills for they would have the difference in freight to pay from Portland to St. Helens. This means a big thing to any such an industry and we cannot hope to secure any such until we are able to say to them that the rates are the same here as at Portland. Terminal rates are in effect at Burlington, half way between St. Helens and Portland and there is no just reason why we can not get them here. Of course the Hill interests are the promoters and owners of the Burlington townsite and they have no interest here, other than to get the business, but if the matter was taken up by the right parties and in the proper way it could very likely be brought about. In any event it is up to St. Helens to make a move.

The State Fair at Salem will be held this year on the week beginning September 2nd, and will no doubt surpass any fair before held by the State. Attention is called to the ad in this issue of the Mist. Columbia County has always carried off some honors at the fair, not always first, but prizes for products, and this year an effort is going to be made to have one of the finest exhibits at the fair, from Columbia County. Every farmer and producer should make some effort to help in getting up this exhibit. It is a great advertisement for the county in which he lives and will have its effect in settling up the community and fixing the value of the lands owned by him.

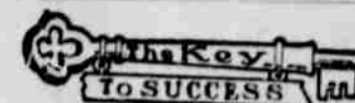
