**County Court
Proceedings**

Be it Remembered, That a regular term of the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Columbia county, was begun and held at the Court House in the City of St. Helens, in said county and state on Wednesday, the 4th day of September, 1912, the same being the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said Court, when were present:

Hon. James Dart, County Judge.
Hon. John Farr, Commissioner.
Hon. W. K. Tichenor, Commissioner.
H. E. LaBare, Clerk. A. E. Thompson, Sheriff.

Due proclamation being made, the following proceedings were had: Journal Read, Approved and signed:

Matter of Petition of Makinster & Nussbaumer for a liquor License for Goble Precinct.

On this 4th day of September, 1912, comes on for hearing the Petition of W. E. Makinster and J. Nussbaumer for a License to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and fermented cider in less quantities than one gallon, in Goble precinct for the period of twelve months;

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proofs filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required; that petitioner has not been convicted of wilfully selling or delivering spirituous, vinous, fermented or malt liquors to a minor, or of wilfully allowing a minor to loiter in or about any place where such liquors are sold or disposed of;

And it further appearing to the Court that said petition contains the signatures of the majority of all the legal voters of said precinct who are actual residents thereof, and who have actually resided therein at least thirty days immediately preceding the signing and presentation of said petition.

And the said Petitioner having filed with the Clerk of this Court a bond duly approved by the County Judge, and also having filed a duplicate receipt of the County Treasurer in the sum of Four Hundred Dollars, and the Court being advised in the premises, it is ordered by the Court that said petition be granted, and that License issue to the said Makinster & Nussbaumer, to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and fermented cider in less quantities than one gallon, in Goble Precinct, for the period of twelve months from this date.

Matter of Sealp Bounty Claim: On this day the Clerk presents to the Court the verified claim of James Wamsley, being claim No. 43 for Two Dollars for One Wild Cat, and the Court being advised in the Matter, it is ordered by the

Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby approved.

Matter of Petition of I. D. Wonderly et. al. For a County Road: On this day the report of the Board of County Road Viewers on the I. D. Wonderly road was read in open Court the first time.

Matter of Petition of E. J. Smith, et. al. For County Road. On this day this matter coming on for consideration by the Court, and it appearing to the Court from the Petition and a copy of the Posted Notices, that the description of said proposed road as written in said petition and does not agree with the description as written in said notices, and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the court that said petition be and the same is hereby denied.

Matter of Petition of S. A. Crosby, et. al. For a County Road: On this 4th day of September, 1912, comes on for hearing the Petition of S. A. Crosby, et. al., freeholders, residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road described as follows: Beginning at a stake marked "A" set 35 rods east of the quarter section corner on the North line of section 2, in Township 4 North Range 2 West of the Willamette Meridian in said county and state, and running thence in a Northwesterly direction to, and terminating at a Stake marked "B" set in the Center of the County road 15 rods North of the Northwest corner of Section 2, in Township 4 North Range 2 West of the Willamette Meridian.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein;

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the town of Yankton on the 16th day of September, 1912, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.
