Walter Tooze, Jr., of Dallas, Ore., held a Republican meeting in St. Helens last Tuesday night and a good sized crowd of voters were present to hear him discuss political issues from the standpoint of a Republican. Mr. Tooze is a young man who has made a study of the political situation as it now is and presented the matters at issue in a very forcible and clear manner. He dwelt upon the main questions at such length as to make it plain why the voters should stand by the party of progress and prosperity and not be led away by the enthusiasm of a defeated but popular candidate, nor to be again induced to vote the democratic party ticket, a party whose record is one of mistakes. His speech was indeed a good rousing campaign talk, and he proved himself a complete master of the situation. He is certainly a chip off the old block, for his father, Walter Tooze Sr., is recognized as one of the ablest campaign speakers in the state. Such arguments as were produced by Mr. Tooze go a long way toward getting into line men who believe in the Republican principles but who are now going astray from a desire to follow a leader who has fought his fight, politically, and is now on the decline, and whose only excuse for being a candidate is to satisfy his own personal ambition and get revenge upon the man who defeated him in the regular Republican Convention.

Men of all parties deeply deplore the attempted killing of Theodore Roosevelt. While a great many of us do not agree with him upon the necessity for third party, or a third term, or his candidacy, we cannot but condemn the act of the would-be assassin. We all honor Mr. Roosevelt for what he has done and what he is, as a great public man, yet there is no reasonable and sane man who would want to see him killed by an assassin's bullet. We want to re-

serve the right to bury him with ballots on the 5th of November so deep that he will not rise again to disrupt the party which has honored and trusted him.
