Forest School

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Nov. 9—"No better investment can be made by the agricultural college for the preparation of young men to become logging engineers," said George M. Cornwall, editor of "The Timberman," discussing plans of school of forestry at the Oregon Agricultural college.

Mr. Cornwall presented a plan to the congress at Tacoma which received enthusiastic endorsement. His special study of the many new problems constantly

arising in large camps has persuaded him that there must be special training for the young men entering the profession, to fit them to apply technical and scientific methods to the lumbering industry. On his initiative he has petitioned the agricultural colleges or universities of California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia to provide such courses on a regular basis with other degree courses. Committees to push the matter in each state, the Oregon committee being composed of J. S. O'Gorman, Wisconsin Logging & Timber Co., Portland; H. C. Clair, Twin Falls Logging Co., Portland; J. D. Young, Inman-Poulsen Lumber Co., Kelso, Wash.

The committee has visited the college, and Prof. G. W. Peavy, head of the college forestry department, has submitted a tentative course, which is being worked out. The committee will ask the next legislature for an appropriation of \$50,000 for a building and equipment for teaching logging engineering at the college. Such a course is at present absolutely impossible, as the college has no suitable facilities. The school of forestry is now crowded into a few rooms on the top floor of Science Hall, where there is no space whatever for demonstration machinery and necessary materials.

"Oregon has the largest amount of standing timber of any state in the Union," said Mr. Cornwall discussing the plans. We have 540,000,000 feet of virgin timber in our forests. It can be seen that logging will be the dominant industry in Oregon for many years to come. For that reason we feel that no better investment can be made by the state than to establish a chair at the agricultural college for the preparation of young men to become logging engineers.

The logging engineering course should consist of three departments in charge of a practical logger, a cruiser and estimator, and an instructor in civil and mechanical engineering with the rudiments acquired at as early an age as possible, the young men of 25 to 28 should be able to assume his position as a logging engineer with every prospect of success.

Now how are we going to go securing the necessary educational facilities for the training of our young men who desire to take up the study of logging engineering? Some steps have been taken by the various universities looking to the equipping of young men for the lumber business, but more especially along forestry lines. But we must go farther. We need the intensely practical training if success is to attend our efforts. Every logging foreman or superintendent of logging is in fact a logging engineer. All we are seeking to accomplish is to better fit that man for his place.

The agricultural colleges have demonstrated their value in equipping the farmer's son with a scientific knowledge of husbandry. The courses of study in our agricultural colleges have been sane, practical and helpful. The lumber industry deserves the same consideration for our young men no desire to become expert lumbermen, in its broadest sense. If not, why not?

The preponderance of the lumber industry of the west justifies this position. Any young man who has the grit and stamina to pitch in, work and study should have an opportunity. He should be able to earn his own way, which makes for self-reliance, dash and daring, fits men for the practical battle of life.

A TROUSERS CENTENARY.

It Was Napoleon's Men Who Brought That Garment Into Fashion. As nearly as can be ascertained it is a hundred years since Napoleon Bonaparte's soldiers introduced the old new style of leg wear which speedily secured recognition as the distinctively masculine garment of civilians throughout two continents.

In 1814—the year before Waterloo—it was related as a current news item of some importance that the great Duke of Wellington had been refused admittance to Almack's in London because he presented himself wearing trousers instead of the conventional breeches which the dress regulations then in vogue demanded.

As a matter of historical fact trousers have been worn by various races and by both sexes in all the ages of which any authentic records exist. Generally speaking, trousers were regarded in ancient times as symbolical of inferiority or effeminacy. In the triumphal processions of the Caesars, for example, prisoners of war wore them as a sign of defeat, while the sturdy legs of Rome's victorious legions were bare below the bottom of the skirted or kilted coat of mail.

For the last hundred years or thereabout trousers have been widely recognized as the garments of authority, the outward and visible sign of the stronger sex, says the American Tailor and Cutter. But that position has not been won or maintained without a struggle. Many attempts have been made to trample down the tyranny of trousers, as their rule has been called. Many times has their superiority been challenged. But so far their position remains secure.

MARVELS OF PANAMA.

The Gatun Dam, the Culabra Cut and the Great Locks.

Panama's marvels are the Gatun dam, the Culabra cut and the locks, each of the six of them with two chambers 1,600 feet long and 110 feet wide.

You think you can manufacture a mental picture of these locks, but you cannot—not till you have gone down their perpendicular sides a thousand feet and got aboard a dummy train that journeys three-fourths of a mile along the bottom; not till you have looked up and seen the cathedral arches springing in glory from side to side and gazed at the steel gables seven feet thick and marked the cistern holes in the bottom of the channel, up and down through which will move the strong streams that will lift and let down the ships of the nations into their cradles with the tenderness of a mother with an infant, for underneath extend culverts the size of railroad tunnels. It is through these and through mighty valves that the locks are filled and emptied.

Move about awhile among these works like a pygmy lost in a labyrinth of the gods and it will dawn on you what sort of thing men have been about here on this neck of Darien.—World's Work.

Iodine Fumigation.

Although for disinfecting superficial wounds and for sterilizing the skin before operations surgeons have long regarded iodine as one of the most useful antiseptics, they have been unable to find a practical way of using it in liquid form in deep wounds. Dr. Louge of Marseilles, France, has devised a method of producing iodine fumes and has used them successfully in treating all kinds of wounds. He dips the end of a piece of cotton in iodoform powder and then lights the cotton at a point where it is free from powder. The fumes of iodine that at once rise can either be applied directly to the affected part or collected in a jar and applied by means of a syringe. The effect of the fumes
