### Ordinance No. 132

An Ordinance to regulate the width and construction of Cement sidewalks in the City of St. Helens, Oregon.  
The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:  
Section 1. Any person hereafter either desiring to construct a Cement or Concrete Sidewalk within the City of St. Helens, Oregon, or being ordered to do so by the Common Council thereof, shall, after the City has established the grade therefor, and the topography of the ground will permit, proceed to construct a cement or concrete curb of the height required, and six inches in thickness, with joints struck at intervals of every 3 feet, the outer edge of which curb shall be 15 feet from the property line;  
Section 2. The walk, itself, shall be constructed of concrete, of proper mixture and proportions, to be not less than 6 feet in width, the inner edge of which, or edge next to the property line, shall be 2 feet from such property line, though the inside space may be of concrete at the entrance of any property owner. And joints shall be struck in squares of 3 feet each.  
Section 3. The spaces between the inner edge of such walk and the property line, and the outer edge of such walk and the curb, above mentioned, shall be filled in with earth, that the same may be beautified or grassed over.  
Section 4. All sidewalk corners where they protrude into the street intersections, shall be solid, as shown by the plat filed herewith and made a part hereof, and all such corners shall be the quadrant of a circle, with a radius of 10 feet, as shown on said plat.
