Great deal of expense was for
heating, lighting and ventilating
and painting old building to make
it conform in every way to, new
part.

Total amounts are correct but
some items that might appear un-
der two or three heads have not
been segregated.

All that is necessary to have rhu-
barb of the finest quality in mid-
winter or early spring is to lift the
roots as cold weather approaches,
leave them exposed until frozen,
then place them in a box in soil and
put them in the cellar.

We usually put them in along in
December and have them ready for
use by February. For later use
they may be put in later, but it is
necessary that they be taken up in
the fall, as it would be difficult after
they are frozen in the ground.

They must be allowed to freeze
or they will not start well. It is
necessary that they have water after
being planted in the boxes, but they
do not need light and will grow
better in a dark cellar. A single
clump of roots from a well-devel-
oped hill affords stalks enough to
give quite an amount of "sass" or
pies.—[Farm and Home.
