



The libraries in the Chemeketa Cooperative Regional Library Service will expand services to rural readers. Starting Friday, those with a free basic card can borrow 10 items at a time.

### Libraries set to increase rural services

Rural readers are in for a treat. On Friday, the libraries in the Chemeketa Cooperative Regional Library Service will increase the maximum number of items persons with a free basic library card can borrow at the same time from one to 10. The number of items readers can put on hold

also will increase to 10. John Goodyear, the cooperative's executive director, said the previous policy of borrowing one book at a time was "pretty restrictive."

"It's going to be a big deal because people didn't

want to bother or didn't know about the one-item card," Goodyear said.

The change affects residents of Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties who live in the cooperative's district but outside one of the 17 libraries' districts. The idea to expand basic services came from the staff of the McMinnville Public Library. The cooperative's libraries unanimously agreed.

"The ultimate goal is to promote literacy," Goodyear said. "The libraries thought they could do more by letting more items at a time go out."

Rural residents pay a tax that supports the cooperative but don't pay city taxes that fund specific libraries. Because of the tax disparity, rural residents wishing to access full services of borrowing up to 50 items at a time rather than one have been paying \$60 per year per household. They will now have the free option of 10 items at a time per household. Children with CARE cards will still be able to borrow 25 items at a time. Those with fullservice cards that expire this month will be given an extension until July 1.
