the State Fire Marshal bans field burning when two of three conditions exist: Temperature over 95 degrees, humidity of 30 percent or less, or winds of 15 miles per hour or

greater. Still, forecasts aren't perfect.

Last year, 12,123 acres were burned, all in Marion County. ODA estimates local communities were impacted by smoke for eight of the 25 days field burning took place.

State law requires farmers to post flaggers and signs when they burn

near roads, but ODA found that doesn't always happen.

The department issued five letters of warning – and one notice of non-compliance to a repeat offender – for the six incidents since 2012. It has not issued any fines for traffic incidents.

During the past six years, ODA also has cited

14 farmers for illegal stack burning, burning without a permit, burning past the "fire out" time, and allowing a field burn to escape and cause a wildfire. It has fined three of those farmers.

along with engineer Jim Huddleston, made the project go. Several other local businesses have assisted the project in critical ways: Knife River, X-Rock, North Santiam Paving, and EZ Grade, to name a few. The Doris Wipper Fund also funded a \$75,000 grant, and there are several other businesses that made key donations."

The district did not use general fund dollars, but did partner in the project with monies that have accumulated over time from work that the district did with the Oregon Department of Energy and large Oregon businesses in the Energy Tax Credit program. This money was released for general purposes this summer.

"We spoke with several districts our size who said that the turf was a great value for their schools and communities," Gardner said. "Another valuable aspect of the project is the sense of pride and commitment in the school

community. We know that the field will be busy in the coming years with community sports and we are excited and looking forward to it."

Stayton High School Vice Principal/Athletic Director Darren Shryock expanded on the implications this project has for the school.

"What it means for Stayton athletics is that we no longer have to rent a field to play on when post-season soccer rolls around. It means our football team won't host a play-off game in the mud this year," Shryock said.

"But what it really means is that our field will now reflect the kind of school SHS is becoming," he continued. "As a school, we have worked extremely hard to raise standards and expectations for our staff and students while developing rapport with the students to make Stayton one of the elite schools in the valley. Our field will now reflect that same mindset.

"In one sense, the field was not necessary; we could still play on the old field and muddle through. In another sense, it was very necessary. The

school grounds and facilities should reflect the outstanding character of the staff and students at Stayton High School. Stayton is quickly becoming 'the school' to attend for high school kids just like our new turf will be 'the place' to play football and soccer games."

Silverton High School Asst. Principal/Athletic Director Greg Kaatz (who has recently assumed the position of principal at Mark Twain Elementary School) echoed that sentiment in speaking of the

new McGinnis Field.

"More user groups will have access to it and it will be open year round," he said. "The kids are excited and the field color and design is beautiful. Kids are proud call the field 'theirs.' We have increased options and use of our outdoor space. It was very complex and beautifully done. This is definitely something Silverton has not done before. There are a lot of folks without whom this would have been possible."

Stayton Booster Club President Randy Forrette summed up these developments as being more than merely school improvements. Talking of the Stayton High School work, his words extend to both schools in realizing a long-time dream.

"It's been a lot of work and there's a lot still to do but what this project has really done is to bring the school and the community together," he said. "There are huge advantages for everyone and it's been amazing the momentum we have achieved through team efforts."

lice arrived. The victim said he was in severe pain, and he'd lost consciousness once. Officers deter-

mined the full beer can met the definition of a dangerous weapon because of the way it was used and that it could have caused serious injury.

The statement listed the alleged crimes as second-degree assault and unlawful use of a weapon.

Free was arrested Tuesday on the assault charges and for failing to register as a sex offender. He was taken to Marion County jail, held on \$60,000 and labelled a flight risk. On Wednesday, he was arraigned on a fourth-degree assault charge.

His next hearing is scheduled for Sept. 1 at 8:30 a.m. at the Marion County Circuit Court Annex.
