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"I used to come here 40 years ago when I was in college," he related to the new restaurant's general manager, Julio Valera of Silverton. "This was the place to come for a meal different from the (seminary) cafeteria."

Valera beamed in his host role as well, listing all the new features: the west-facing redwood bar, a pending patio to be adorned with an outdoor fireplace affording al fresco seating to the east and a fenced play area planned to the south around an 18,000-gallon water tower tucked into the project, directed by the local rural fire mar-

shal.

The popular rural eatery and watering hole burned down in July of 2014, scorching generations of memories in the process. Waibel appropriately evoked the rising of the phoenix in his invocation, witnessed by roughly a dozen on hand, including owner Mark Burnett, Valera, new chef Nick Seabergh and a legion of contract workers stepping up the labors in line with hopes of a New Year's Eve opening.

That opening is not etched in stone, Valera and Burnett both stress, but the aim beyond a given date is to ensure the MarKum Inn hospitality and features of yore are kindled anew when it opens in earnest.

Valera said initially

they will just serve dinner; when they're ready it will be an 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. eatery with lunch and dinner.

"We'll have 12 beers on tap, two of them from 7 Brides Brewery (Silverton)," Valera said.

"Will you serve Abbey beer?" Waibel probed. "We're going to be building a brewery at the (Mt. Angel) Abbey."

That may come down the road. For sure, MarKum burgers will be on the menu. So will prime rib on Sundays. New to the mix is a wood-fired oven out of which 10-inch pizzas will be served.

Salem resident Seabergh hails from Mississippi, and the chef assures that: "there will be some southern sensibility in the cooking for sure."

An Illinois native transplanted to Scotts Mills, Burnett appeared a gleam at the prospect of launching, or re-launching this popular Mid-Wilamette Valley site with new energy – buttressed by the purpose of the mid-day's gathering.

Burnett described the wood-fired feature bottom to top, revealing that top-end temperatures can reach some 1,200 degrees.

"So we do need this blessed," he jested with the local priest.

Shortly afterward there was reverent moment as Waibel performed the blessing, and invoked the phoenix.
