Prather was deployed to Afghanistan for more than a year in 2014 and 2015. He worked protection duty; a "GA" or "guardian angel" to the people he looked after. Overseas, he said, you basically know the enemy and the kinds of situations you're going to find yourself in.

That's not always the case with wildfires.

Thompson, of the 142nd Fighter Wing, was deployed in Romania two years ago when wildfires last cut major swaths through Oregon. the These areas included land near her childhood home in John Day; a fire crept to within a few miles of her family's cabin.

She couldn't do anything then, but this year she will have the opportunity to defend someone

else's house. "You protect your home, you protect your state," she said. "Your home's on fire, you got to do something about it.'


