You may do this only for the rent you owe your current landlord. If you do this, you must do so before the foreclosure sale. The business or individual who buys this property at the foreclosure sale is not responsible to you for any deposit or prepaid rent you paid to your landlord.

ABOUT YOUR TENANCY AFTER THE FORECLOSURE SALE:

The new owner that buys this property at the foreclosure sale may be willing to allow you to stay as a tenant instead of requiring you to move out after 90 days or at the end of your fixed term lease. After the sale, you should receive a written notice informing you that the sale took place and giving you the new owner's name and contact information. You should contact the new owner if you would like to stay. If the new owner accepts rent from you, signs a new residential rental agreement with you or does not notify you in writing within 30 days after the date of the foreclosure sale that you must move out, the new owner becomes your new landlord and must maintain the property. growth, leaving the survivors with plenty of room to grow. The tell-tale sign of this juniper's advanced age is its rounded crown. Post settlement junipers grow in crowded stands with pointed tops that strain to reach the sunlight.

The juniper's graybrown bark is tough and fibrous. Sinewy ridges interlace on its surface. The bark smells like a cedar chest in a dusty attic. Scaly needles and berrylike cones decorate its snow-caked branches. I tip my hat to these venerable old trees and plow ahead.

Yesterday's footprints end and I become the first human to flounder through these deep drifts. Other creatures have been here before me, texturing the snow with tracks. They have written the story of their morning rounds on this vast white page. Two parallel lines of precisely spaced divots show where a shrew sprinted across the trail. Its tiny feet left barely perceptible depressions on the soft surface. The hopping tracks of two squirrels meet up, scatter the snow in a brief scuffle and then go their separate ways. Next to the water, I find the joyful signature of a river otter who used the riverbank as a sledding hill. It bounded up the slope and slid headfirst back to the water, leaving a slippery trough behind.

Up ahead a metal boardwalk spans a jumble of huge boulders. A basalt wall rises above the opposite side of the river. This dark rampart is a reminder of the high desert's volcanic heritage. The rimrock above me is an unforgiving place where raptors nest, bobcats den and sagebrush struggles to survive.

My legs grow weary from breaking trail in the deep snow and I decide to turn back. As I retrace my steps along the river, I think about why hiking is important to me. The simple act of walking in nature is reverent behavior. I choose not to experience the living world on a blue-lit screen. I want to feel nature in all its moods not as an onlooker, but as a participant. To intuit the mystery and meaning of trees, otters, streams and shrews is to glimpse the soul of nature. I am just learning to see.
