### New Branch

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 23.—Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state today of the Minidoka & Southwestern Railway company. The road is to be constructed as a branch of the Short Line and is intended to open a great tract of land being brought under cultivation by the Twin Falls irrigation project. The length of the road is stated in the papers filed to be 25 miles, but it is the general belief it will be carried down Rock creek to the Snake river and down the latter stream to Glenn's Ferry and constitute a portion of the main line. King Hill, east of Glenn's Ferry, would thus be cut out and the road for more than 100 miles would run through a cultivated country and often in sight of picturesque scenery along the Snake, making a great contrast with the present route across Lava desert. E. E. Calvin, vice president of the

Short Line, is named as president of the new company. Other officials of the Short Line and Union Pacific fill other places.
