



For mending broken crockery there nothing better than white lead. It is one of the few coments that resist both water and heat. Smear in thinly on the edges of the article, press them together and set it aside to dry. A waterproof glue for repairing mar-ble or porcelain may be made by mix-ing plain white glue and milk, says the Boston Bost ing piain white give and mine, says the Boston Post. Into two quarts of skim milk put half a pound of the best white give. Put the basin of hot taining this into another basin of hot water.
