REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION APRIL 14

State Central Committee Recommends April Second as the Date For Holding the Republican Primaries.

Thursday April 14th has been fixed by the state central committee for the holding of the state republican convention in Portland and April 2nd is the date recommended for holding of the primaries through the state. The convention will consist of 361 delegates based on one delegate for each 150 votes cast for Judge Bean. Untou County will be entitled to 10. Multnomah as usual with her 71 votes will to a very large extent control, provided they vote as a unite.

Arranging Furniture.
When the sitting or drawing room is large enough it is always a good idea to arrange the furniture in cozy little groups. Where there is a fireplace a delightful effect is produced by placing a settee at one side at a right angle and a large chair opposite, with a small table perhaps beside it, for reading lamp and books. Near the window may be another group of chairs and a little table. Lounging chairs are out of place in a room where visitors are formally received, but the chairs should be large and comfortable to sit on.

Packings Pastry.
Instead of putting away pastry, such as cheese cakes, jam tarts, etc., held in reserve in a large tin and fetching out when wanted it will be found more convenient to pack about the number likely to be needed at one time in two pound biscuit tins. Line the tins with buttered paper, covering the pies carefully over and closing tightly, thus avoiding admitting air more than is necessary and also preventing breaking the edges and spoiling the appearance.

A Game of Skill.
Did you ever try throwing cards in a hat? It is great fun. Take an old high hat, place it on the floor, then let the players in turn stand at a distance from it—say ten or twelve feet. Take an ordinary pack of cards and toss them one by one in the hat as far as possible. A prize to him who gets in the greatest number adds to the interest.

After a little practice it is remarkable how skillful one may become. During the civil war there was one description of a "game" made thousands of dollars before the authorities restrained him. This rascal would send letters broadcast, wherein he said: "I would communicate for \$2 a sum means of escaping the conscription. Letters including two dollar notes pinned on him, and in reply to each letter he would send a printed slip reading: "Join the nearest volunteer regiment."
