THE NON VOTERS IN UNION COUNTY.

For some reason or other a large number of citizens of Oregon of voting age do not vote at state elections and a very considerable number do not vote at presidential elections.

The last U. S. Census gives the males of voting age in Oregon in 1900 at 144,445, from which, after deducting 10,340 Indians, Japanese and Chinamen, leaves 134,105 voters. At the presidential election in 1900 the total vote cast in Oregon for all the candidates was 83,941, showing that 50,165 males of voting age did not record their votes for president.

In the state election held in June preceding the presidential election in November, 1900, the three opposing candidates for the supreme judgeship received in the aggregate 81,950 votes, being 52,156 votes less than the males of voting age in the state. At the same election in both congressional districts the votes cast aggregated 82,948, being 998 more votes than were cast for supreme judge but 51,158 less than the voting population as counted by the U. S. census taken the same year.

The fact, and it appears to be one, that less than two thirds of the voters in Oregon go to the polls is both significant and suggestive and should receive serious consideration.

The last U. S. Census reports, Vol. 1 page 995, give the male population of Union county 21 years of age and over a 5,306, of which 237 are aliens, leaving 5,069 voters. Two years after the U. S. Census at the June election 1902, there were cast in Union county for supreme judge 3,007, as follows:

For Bean, rep. 1430, Bauham, dem. 1325, Bright, P. prohibition, 249. Without reckoning any increase for the two prosperous years following the taking of the census, the number of legal voters in Union county who did not vote at the June election in 1902 were 2,092.

The votes cast in Union county June 1902 for governor aggregated 2,823 as follows:

Chamberlain 1760 and Furbush 1060, showing that 3,249 fewer votes were cast for both candidates for governor in Union county than there were legal voters in the county two years before. This discrepancy can not be accounted for by assuming a decrease in population for it is well known that there was a large increase to the voting population of Union county. The cause for the absence from the polls on election day of at least half of the legal voters is worthy of serious consideration.

The aggregate of the votes cast in Oregon in 1895 for the several candidates for president was 97,357.

ORDERED BACK

Russia Orders Several of its Battleships Back to Russian Waters. Japs Hot After them.

Paris, Feb. 20.—According to the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Figaro, the Russian government, fearing for the safety of the battleship Orel and the cruisers Dumny, Donkoi and Aurora and their convey of torpedo-boat destroyers and transports now at Jubail, French Somaliland, at the entrance to the Red Sea, has ordered to return to the Russian waters at once.

It is known that a Japanese flying squadron is lying in wait to capture this fleet should it continue its cruise toward Port Arthur.

The French Academy.
The French academy is one of the five academies and the most eminent constituting the Institute of France. It was founded in 1635 by Cardinal Richelieu and reorganized in 1795. It is composed of forty members, the new member elected by the remaining thirty-nine members for life after personal application and the submission of their nomination to the head of the state. It meets twice weekly at the palace Mazarin, 23 Quai Conti, Paris, and is the highest authority on everything pertaining to the sciences of the French language—to grammar, rhetoric and poetry and the publication of the French classics. The chief officer is the secretary, who has a life tenure of his position. A chair in the academy is the highest addition of most literary Frenchmen.
