Willing to Mediate.

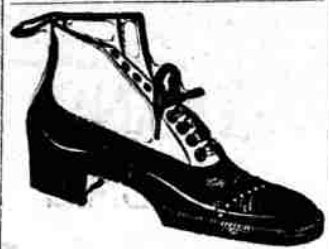
