THE TOMORROW OF ASIA.

The war now going on in Asia between Japan and Russia may be the breaking up of the old conditions that have made the United States but disinterested spectators of what was going on there. The clash of arms that we hear from there may be but the rasping of ropes and creaking of tackle blocks incident to the raising of the curtains that have concealed the doings of nearly a billion of people. When the curtains that have hid two thirds of the inhabitants of the earth from the observation of the other third for thousands of years have been rolled up or down, the United States may behold things clearly of which it has heretofore had but slight glimpses. We know too little of what will actually be revealed, to at this time form but imperfect ideas of the extent to which our interests may be affected by the great change that now seems about to take place in the veritable cradle of the human race.

There is no doubt but the United States will be most emphatically affected by the change but whether for good or evil no man can now foresee. Neither can we form an intellectual idea as to how we will be affected should victory perch upon either one of the hostile banners. Should Russia win, Japan and China, commercially at least, will be dominated by Russia, and the trade of the other peoples that compose the western world will have to pay tribute in a greater or less degree for any privilege the czar may accord them, to do business in that extensive portion of earth.

Should Japan win and become the land dominant in the Orient, then what? Events, as we get glimpses of them, plainly indicate that China and Japan have an understanding that puts their hopes on common ground. We are in total

ignorance of what that common ground is, but from what we do know of the apparently fixed sentiment of the 400,000,000 Chinese and the traditional feeling of all Asiatics in regard to foreigners, there is a strong probability that the common ground upon which China and Japan are standing is the one lately expressed by a high official at the Tokio court: "All Asia for the Asiatics," which is but a polite formula for expressing the Boxers' battle cry, "Out with the foreign devils."

Should Japan win, and she can win only by China's aid, either actively exerted or quietly employed, intelligent and ambitious Japan will quickly see, if she does not now, that to be the laud of the Orient she has only to declare a Monroe Doctrine, "Asia for the Asiatics" which she will be able to enforce and thus compel all western people to submit to such terms as she may impose or not trade with China or Japan. In such a case who can tell how the United States would fare?

The demand for ministers in this state is greater than the supply. There are two vacancies in this city at the present time and we note from our many exchanges that there are vacant pulpits in not a few cities in the state.

The republican county central committee meets in this city Friday to arrange for the campaign. There has been no date set as yet for a meeting of the democratic central committee.

All indications point to an immense wheat crop this season. The fall grain is growing fine.

This is ideal beet weather and an increased tonnage so far seems assured.

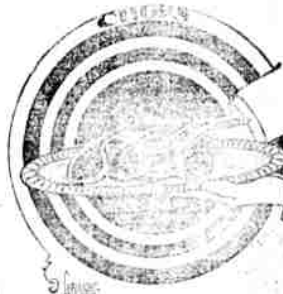
