

ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS IN AUSTRIAN TOWN

Brutally Outrage Women and Children--Many Killed--Is Caused By The Russian Defeats.

Vienna, May 7.—There were serious anti-Jewish riots in the Austrian town of Lemberg in which five persons were killed and many were injured.

GIRL BRUTALLY MURDERED
A girl was murdered in a most revolting manner, the reports say, and the outrage was said to have been due to the anger of the crowd over Russian reverses in the far East.

How It Was Done
Port Arthur Now Completely Surrounded by Japs--Just by a Little Head Work.

Tokio May 7.—General Honoya, detailing the landing of Japanese troops on Lia Tung peninsula, in his official report, says the seventh division, with torpedo boats and two transports, arrived off Lia Tung the morning of May 5; bombarded a number of the enemy's patrols and landed a party of sailors who waited ashore a thousand yards and took possession of a range of hills, planting the flag without a shot. Three gunboats were employed to distract the enemy's attention, killing several.

The first fleet of transports, seeing the flag on the hill, began landing at 8 o'clock last night, the troops wading ashore until piers were erected.

Japanese have landed at two points in the vicinity of Port Arthur—at Pichewo and Port Adams. The two places are on opposite sides of Kwang Tung peninsula, and the forces landed are only 20 miles apart.

Falls from Ladder
Chicago May 7.—From a ladder 150 feet up the side of a temporary tower at Steger, Ill., Michael Trutczak fell to instant death today. Fifty fellow working men in a piano factory witnessed the plunge. His neck was broken.
