There is a wide spread opinion that the government of the United States is very expensive because the Congress appropriates about one billion of dollars at its two sessions. The Department of Commerce and Labor has been looking into the matter and finds as follows: The amount of money per capita of the population necessary to be raised for the Government is, in the United States, \$7.97; in Germany, \$9.45; in Spain, \$10.09; in France, \$17.84; in Great Britain, \$21.39; in New Zealand, \$38.88.

Nobody but some boss or machine politician can conscientiously oppose the amendment, because it simply places the nominating power in the hands of the voters, instead of with packed conventions. Notice To Water Consumers. Ordinance No. 218 provides that—The water rates shall be due payable in advance at the office of City Recorder on the first day of each month (except for meters, which are payable on the first day of the succeeding month), and if not paid within the first ten days the water will be shut off the premises, and not turned on until payment is made of amount due with one dollar in addition for the expense of turning water off and on.
