Ordinance No 287 Series of 1904

An ordinance authorizing and directing the Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon, to enter into a written contract with J L Mars for the construction of foundation for City Hall.

The City of La Grande does ordain as follows:—
Section One:—That the Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande Union county, Oregon, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to enter into a written contract with J L Mars for the construction of foundation for City Hall of said City of La Grande, Oregon.

Section Two:—That said contract shall be in accordance with the terms of the proposition of the said J L Mars submitted to and accepted by the council of the City of La Grande on the 18th day of May A D 1904.

Section Three:—That this ordinance shall be published in the La Grande Evening Observer for one issue thereof and shall be in full force and take effect from and after the 14th day of May A D 1904.

Passed by the council of the said city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 18th day of May A D 1904 by five members voting in favor.
