## Labor War

Victor, Colo. June 7—Three hundred pounds of dynamite placed in a mine by unknown persons under the depot of the Florence and Cripple Creek station at Independence was exploded at 2 o'clock this morning while 15 non-union miners employed at the Findlay mine located on Bull Hill were standing upon the platform in twenty killing 11, fatally injuring 8 and seriously injuring 2 others.

Washington, D. C. June 7—Arrangements have been made for the various members of the cabinet to go upon the stump this fall in the interest of the administration. Every effort will be put forth to give these speeches the widest circulation. Different topics of the campaign and likewise various achievements of the administration will be distinctly treated and some of the speeches will be very carefully prepared. Later they will be printed in pamphlet form and will be spread broadcast for the perusal of voters.

## Begins Advance

Chefoo, June 7—A Japanese correspondent from Dalny confirms the reported advance of the Japanese army on Port Arthur, news of which was brought here today by the Chinese. The correspondent states, however, that there are 15 miles between the Japanese and Port Arthur instead of seven, as reported by the Chinese. The Japanese army is advancing along both coasts. It is reported that the peninsula's division on the east coast fought a battle within 15 miles of Port Arthur June 3. The result of the battle has not yet been learned. A junk, which lay off Port Arthur June 4 because of a lack of wind,

also reported that a Japanese ship was seen as they disappeared below the horizon.
