In Colorado
Cripple Creek June 8—Under the regime of hundreds of deputy sheriffs and about 150 militiamen receiving their orders from Edward Bell the wealthy mine owner who succeeded. Mr Robertson when he resigned under threats of lynching yesterday the gold mining district passed a comparatively peaceful day. Throughout the day soldiers scoured the hills for union miners and the sum total of the day's arrests was 19. This swelled the number of men confined in the "Bull pen" to considerably over 300 and tonight 24 of them was placed aboard a special train and departed from the district. A guard of deputies rode out of the district with them. The men were all unionists and served as leaders in the strike now pending. Three additional city officials were forced to resign their offices today namely Chief of Police Wm Graham, Justice of the Peace Chas Harrington. Their reputed sympathy for unionism led to this action. In each case a committee of the Citizen's Alliance waited upon them and compelled them to act immediately under threat of violence.

Niu Chwang, June 8—A private telegram just received from Shan Hai

Kwan says that Lewis Etzel, correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph and Kaross Brindle of the London Daily Mail were fired upon by Chinese soldiers while in a junk between Shwantaitse and Erdiko Etzel was killed but Brindle is believed to be safe. They left here on June 3 to investigate the movements of some bandits. Etzel was a native of Butler Pa., and his father resides near either Denver Colo., or San Diego Cal.

CONSUL MILLER ACTS
Niu Chwang, June 8—United States Consul-General Miller has left here by special train for the scene of the killing of Lewis Etzel of Butler Pa., correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph who was shot by Chinese soldiers between Shwantaitse and Erdiko. The Consul will make a personal investigation of the death of Mr Etzel.

Third Squadron

St Petersburg, June 8—Grande Duke Alexis commander in chief of the navy according to an apparently reliable report has obtained permission of the Emperor to create a third Pacific squadron from the ships of the Black Sea fleet and permission has already been obtained from Turkey to take the ships through the Dardanelles on condition they will not return. The squadron will sail for the Far East simultaneously with the Baltic squadron. The Associated Press is unable to obtain any confirmation of the report.

The Greek Church.
The Chief Procurator of Russia, in a late report to the Czar on the state of Russian religion, brings out the fact that the power and wealth of the Greek Church are immense. There are 66,780 of these churches in the Empire. During the last year 833 new places of

worship were consecrated. In connection with these churches are 16,858 head priests and 36,146 nuns, 2,050 priests and 43,743 ordinary priests. These, together with 58,156 deacons and underdeacons, make a grand total along with seven other divisions, the figures of which are not given exactly, of 170,000 persons in official positions. A sum of 6,000,000 was paid by the Russian government last year for the support of this vast organization.
