CROP REPORT IN

The Crop Reporter, a monthly, published by authority of the Secretary of use 1904 received by the Observer on Sanday the 19 inst. gives the crop con dition in the United States as follow-

Preliminary returns to the Chief or the Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Agriculture on the acreage of spring wheat sown indicate an area of 17,140,800 acres, a decrease of 116,100 acres, or 0 7 per cent, from the revised estimate of the acreage sown last year

The averege condition of spring wheat on June 1 was 93 4 as compared with 95 9 at the corresponding date last year, 95 4 on June 1, 1902, and ten-year average of 93 8.

The average condition of winter wheat on June 1 was 77.7 as compared with 76 5 on May 1, 1904, 82 2 on June 1, 1903, 76,1 at the corresponding date in 1202 and a ten-year average of 79 8 The total reported area in oats i about 27,646,000 acres, a reduction of 36,300 scree, or 0.3 per cent from the

area sown last year. The average condition of oats on June 1 was 89 2 against 85.5 on June 1, 1903, 90 6 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten-year average of 89.9

The acreage reported as under barley exceeds that barvested last year by sbout 153,000 acres or 3.1 per cent

The average condition of barley is 90 5 against 91.5 on June 1, 1903, 93.6 at the corresponding date in 1902, and a ten-year average of 89.0

Princeville June 20—The first depre-dation as a result of the out flicting territories occupied by the castlemen and sheep owners in this county oc-curred last Menday when 55 sheep be-triging to Alite Jones were shot and killed on Mel creek by masked men who threstened a greater alanguer if he bind was not removed from that he came.

The killing happened on the west side of Mill creek, the herd of sheep being in charge of Tom Paine wio was surprised and unable to off ir auy resistance when the attack occurred
