RINEHART REUNION

Members of the Tribe Continue to Gather at the Camping Ground Near Summerville.

Summerville, June 24, 1904
 Editor Observer:—
 Still the Rinehart tribe gathers at the camping ground 1 1/2 miles above Summerville in the beautiful grove on the J H Rinehart old homestead. A large number came in yesterday among them from a far distance was L B Rinehart and wife from North Yakima. L B was properly waited upon by a committee and tied to a tree and blind folded while we all gave him a hearty hand shake that was a punishment on him for not arriving on time. At 2 o'clock p m the meeting was called to order by President J H Rinehart and business of importance was discussed by different members of the family from all parts of the globe after the meeting was closed they all gathered at the grand stand. Robert Drinkwater of Harney Oregon appeared with his violin and Alice Drinkwater at the piano and soon the sweet strains of music began after that was closed their were short speeches and songs from different ones of the tribe bon fires were kept up until 10 o'clock p m when all retired until morning. 7:30 this morning breakfast was over and the small boy and his fire crackers was heard and all enjoyed themselves. Tomorrow will be a public day when

all are invited to attend and bring their dinner pails with them and have a general picnic and tomorrow evening there will be a display of fire works for children, there are now 121 members of the tribe enjoying themselves, one of the greatest visits that any one could have, some had not met for 25 years and several had not met for 25 years but we are now together, and can talk of olden times surely a happy meeting it will be. This afternoon will be spent in decorating the graves of the departed ones that are buried in the Summerville cemetery. The ages of the ones present will range from 74 years down to 6 months. This leaves everybody in the best of humor and all eating hearty under a big tent where they can feed 75 at a time.

Ladd Canyon
 The Ladd Canyon school closed yesterday with a picnic.
 There were about 200 present. An excellent program was given and one of the finest dinners ever set before a hungry crowd was served.
 The afternoon was passed in amusements of different kinds the most appreciated was the serving of ice cream and cake about four o'clock.
 Mr Fox who was the last teacher has accepted the school for next winter, and all are looking forward to another good years work.

A Noted Mormon Dead
 Ael A Woodruff a widely known and highly respected Apostle of the Mormon Church, died five days ago in Old Mexico of the small-pox, which he contracted in that country.
 His many friends will be pained to learn of the Apostle's death as well as the death of his wife, which occurred two weeks before that of Apostle Woodruff, and of the same dread disease.

Funeral
 The funeral of Fred, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Crawford of Kamela, took place this morning at 9 o'clock in the M E church, Rev. Walker officiating. The interment took place in the Masonic cemetery. The body arrived on the morning train accompanied by the family and many friends.

 There were about twenty present, and the evening was spent in a pleasurable manner by playing games upon the lawn.

After enjoying the music and the eloquence of the readers, those present were given all the lemonade they could drink, and departed to their homes well pleased with the entertainment.

State deputy game warden A W Nye, who resides in Pendleton is a La Grande visitor today. The object of his visit is to see that parties who have dams across the Grande Ronde river, must provide fish ladders. He served notice on the interested parties who promised to immediately comply with the law. Mr. Nye is an old Eastern Oregon pioneer. He first passed through La Grande in 1862 and conducted a pack train between Jamilla and Fort Boise.
