Elam Jones from Starkey was in town yesterday, and reports that the late frosts have done a great deal of damage in that vicinity, and that his grain is so badly damaged, it will no more than make good hay unless a rain comes soon.

T. T. Glenn of Summerville is in the city today and reports that the frost did a great deal of injury to the grain through the valley and that many will cut their fields for hay. Mr. Glenn states that the recent freeze was much harder than three years ago, but like that year it was difficult to tell the exact damage as some made a mistake by cutting their crops for hay and others would have done better had they done so. Mr. Glenn states that he considers that about one third of the fall grain is injured. The spring sown grain has been set back some by the freeze but to what extent it is injured, if any will depend upon conditions later.

SOON TO BATTLE DRY LAND ALFALFA

Dispatches Confirm the Belief that the Great Decisive Battle is Imminent.

St. Petersburg, June 28.—General Sakharoff's dispatch received tonight confirms the belief that the great decisive battle of the campaign between Kurypatkin's main army and the armies of Generals Kuroki and Oku is imminent. The three armies aggregate 300,000 men and their outposts are today in touch all along the line. The Japanese evidently tried to draw Kurypatkin as far south as possible, holding out as an incentive a check to the advance of Oku's main army. Meantime Oku swung sharply to the eastward to join Kuroki toward Chapau pass. Kuroki at the same time moving a strong force by the right flank toward Hai Cheng.

The main Japanese advance continues along the main Feng Wang Cheng Liao Yang road avoiding Mao Tieng pass by a detour to the northward. The advance in all points is being attended by skirmishing.

Nothing is known here of the exact point at which Kurypatkin's main force is concentrated, though it is believed a large part of the Liao Yang force has been moved to a point between Kin Chao and Ta Tehe Kiao.

According to the Associated Press dispatches from Ta Tehe Kiao today a large force has pushed southward from Ta Tehe Kiao against Oku. While Kurypatkin is thus extending himself, the Japanese with great mobility seem to be trying to concentrate for the purpose of striking the Russians in the flank and rear.

Bids Fair to Prove a Considerable Factor in The Solution of the Hay Problem.

Dry land alfalfa seems pretty sure to be a dominant factor in solving the problem of producing more hay, along with the increase of stock from year to year, in the North Powder country, according to a statement of "Jim" White as authority. "This dry land alfalfa will grow on any of the dry hills of this country, without irrigation," said Mr. White while in town one day this week. "I sowed a pound of this dry land alfalfa seed late this spring, for experiment. Notwithstanding the seed being sown too late—after the heavy rains were over—it came up and is growing better than I anticipated. This alfalfa will grow to a length of four feet, and two tons of it is worth three tons of irrigated or wet land alfalfa."

James Gilkinson, Sr., sowed about 100 acres of this alfalfa early in the spring, on his hill land north of town, and reports it as growing almost as well as hop vines. It is expected that with another year there will be a great deal of this kind of hay grown.
