### Hood River Berries

M C Evans, a Hood River farmer and strawberry-grower states the straw berry crop this year aggregated 95,000 crates, stating that 110 full cars of berries, containing 600 crates each, were sent out from Hood River, and that express shipments amounted to between 25,000 and 27,000 crates. "This crop will easily reach 50,000 crates," said Mr Evans. "Foothill berries from as far as 26 miles from Hood River are now coming in, and while the valley crop is of course ended, quite a few consignments daily are brought down from the higher elevations.

"An average price of about \$1.50 a crate was realized by Hood River growers this year. The first crates of the season brought \$5; the closing price was \$1. The foothill berries are bringing from \$2 to \$2.50. It cost 1 1/2 cents for picking and 1/2 cent for packing. Counting in addition the price of crates and boxes, hauling and other incidentals, the expense of harvesting a crate of berries would perhaps average 75 cents, leaving a profit of 75 cents per crate, or approximately \$70,000 to Hood River growers from this one commodity.
