## WRECKED COUNCIL SHIP

Out of 774 Persons  
128 Are Known to  
Have Been Saved.

London, July 6.—Of 774 souls on the Danish steamer Norge 128, including Captain Gundel, are known to have been saved up to this hour. One of the children died in the lifeboat which brought the others to safety. For the missing 646 persons small hope is entertained. In addition to 26 persons who landed at Grimsby, 102 survived. They were all in a pitiable condition. Many were taken to the hospital and the rest of them had to be carried ashore. Captain Gundel said:

"All went well until about 7:45 o'clock last Tuesday, when about 18 miles south of Rockall, I felt the steamer strike heavily forward on a sunken rock. I stood on the bridge with Chief Officer Carpenter. Soundings were made and it was reported there was five feet of water in the forward hold. Orders were given to commence pumping and also to the passengers to put on life belts and be ready to get into the boats which were ordered to be put out.

"The crew worked nobly under the leadership of the chief officers. Seven boats got safely away, the life savers were out adrift and the steamer went down by the bow.

"I went down with the steamer. My right leg got jammed between two stanchions and was very much injured. When I rose to the surface I noticed a number of bodies floating. The Norge was afloat only about 20 minutes after striking."

### Killed By Powder

St. Joseph, Mo., July 5.—An unknown man was killed on North May street tonight by giant cracker which he held in his hand at the time it exploded. Eight persons were badly injured.

### La Grande vs Pendleton

Of the three games of base ball which were played here on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th, the first was the only close or interesting game, and was witnessed by a good crowd. This game resulted in a well earned victory for La Grande and the score was 8 to 6 in her favor. The second game was something fierce. La Grande went to bat in the inferiority of the game, and in the first half, every man of the nine in the team scored. After this the Pendleton boys literally "went to pieces," and never recuperated during the game, which was not played out, being given up at the end of the seventh inning by the visitors. This game was another victory to the home team, and the score was 15 to 5 in their favor.

The third game, which was played on the fourth was witnessed by the largest crowd that ever attended a ball game in La Grande. The grandstand and bleachers were filled, and scores were compelled to stand up.

Although the Pendleton boys played harder ball than on the former day yet they were defeated by a score of 18 to 8, which clearly shows that they were outclassed by the La Grande team.

### Ordinance No 291 Series of 1904.

"An Ordinance authorizing and directing the Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon, to enter into a written contract with J. L. Slater for the construction of City Hall, for said City.

THE CITY OF LA GRANDE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande, Ore., be and hereby are authorized and directed to enter into a written contract with J. L. Slater for the construction of City Hall for said City.

Section 2. That said contract shall be in accordance with the terms of the call for bids for the construction of said City Hall and the proposition of said J. L. Slater to construct the same, accepted by the Council of the said City of La Grande, Oregon on the 5th day of June, A. D. 1904.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall be published in the La Grande, Evening Observer for one issue thereof and shall be in full force and take effect on the 6th day of June, 1904.

Passed by the Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon on the 5th day of July, A. D. 1904, by six members voting therefor.

The city council are to be commended for their labors and the carefulness of their action, which from the inception of this work has been under extraordinary pressure.

Mr. Slater has been a contractor in this city for many years and our citizens all know the work will be completed within the least possible time and when completed the work will be well done. The same could also have been said of any of the contracting odders.

The funeral was held at Enterprise this morning.
