IS NOT SO BAD

Hon. J. W. Scriber, the La Grande and Sumpter banker is in Baker City today on his way to Sumpter. He says that Grande Ronde is not so badly hurt by the frosts a few nights ago as was at first thought. A general destruction of the beet crop was at first reported but the young vegetation is recovering rapidly and will produce a fair crop. The foundation for the new City Hall, which is in fact to be converted into a County Court house and to be present-

ed to the County, is completed and the walls will go up at once. The contractors are under bonds to complete the building by September 1. When asked about the Red Boy mine, Mr. Scriber said he was not here in the interest of that institution in any manner.—Herald

Bad Sidewalks

Olympia, Wash., July 8.—The city clerk yesterday drew a warrant in favor of Rose G. Gallamore for \$5514, which sum represents the amount of damages with costs of trial and interest accruing since judgment was rendered. Miss Gallamore sustained severe personal injuries by falling on a defective sidewalk in Olympia, she obtained a judgment in the lower court for \$7000 the city appealed from this judgment and the Supreme Court reduced the amount to \$5,000 considering the original judgment excessive. The litigation was dragged through the courts for several years.
