COUNTY COURT

The bonds of the County officers were approved and filed, and the officers installed July 6, 1904.

The matter of the appointment of a Road Supervisor for Road District No. 38 was continued for the term.

The application of W. M. Pierce for the redemption of certain lands was continued for the term.

The report of the Board of County Road Viewers in the matter of the proposed County road petitioned for by U. F. English et al was read on two several days of the term and approved, and all papers and reports were submitted to the District Attorney as to the legality of the proceedings had.

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The petition of George Gettle et al for proposed County Road was continued for the term.

The application of James Odell for the redemption of certain County Warrants called by the Treasurer on April 19, 1902 and not presented for payment within the time provided by law, was denied.

The resignation of S. M. Goff as Supervisor of Road Dist. No. 3 was accepted, and the appointment of his successor was continued for the term.

The remonstrance against and motion to dismiss the proceedings in the matter of the proposed Road petitioned for by D. McDonald et al, was overruled and denied; and upon approval by the District Attorney of the proceedings to be had, the Supervisor of Road Dist. No. 37 was ordered to open up said road and place the same in repair for travel.

The petition of certain residents of Starkey Prairie to require the Grande Ronde Lumber Company to construct a bridge over Starkey Creek, was continued for the term.

The petition of certain residents and tax payers of Road District No. 27, asking that certain repairs on bridges and grading of roads be made, was continued for the term.

The petition of the Grande Ronde Lumber Co. for the vacation of a portion of the County Road near Perry, Oregon, and relocation of that portion of County road declared vacated was granted upon the Grande Ronde Lumber Company's deeding a certain strip of land to the County over which the proposed road is to be located.

Charity transportation was granted John J. Burns to Pendleton, Oregon; and Bert L. Martin to Baker City, Oregon.

Appropriations were made to the following indigent persons, namely: Ella Neason, \$15; George May, \$3; Anna Holman, \$12; John Medlock, \$5; Inez Guild, \$12; John Hildebrand, \$8.

The application of David B. Conner for relief was continued for the term.
