Osteopaths Meet

The American Osteopathic Association began its eight annual meeting yesterday morning, the session being held in the State room of the Missouri building. Eight hundred members were present and when the meeting is called to order today it is expected that there will be 1,500 in attendance. Doctor Charles Hazard of New York the president, called the meeting to order at ten o'clock yesterday morning. The exercises consisted of the reports of the officers and the reading of papers. Doctor Clement A. White read a paper on the "Importance of Laboratory Diagnosis to the Physician." "Osteopathic Surgery, Including Treatment of Fractures," was discussed in a paper by Doctor J. B. Littlejohn. Beginning each day at 12 o'clock clinics will be had, and how different maladies may be treated by osteopathy will be demonstrated. Yesterday diabetes and asthma were taken up. Doctor Lucius P. Meaker demonstrated the treatment of the former disease and the discussion was led by Doctor C. W. Fryover, Doctor G. M. Laughlin was demonstrator in the asthma clinic and doctor F. E. Moore led the discussion. The work will be resumed this morning at the Missouri building. At Federal Hall tonight President Francis will welcome the members of the association, and several other addresses will be made. The science of osteopathy was discovered and was practiced by Doctor A. T. Still at Kirksville, Mo., 1852. Since then it has spread until it has reached every state in the Union, and is practiced in many of the European countries. The school of osteopathy at Kirksville and its branches have graduated more than 3,500 students, and this number is now practicing the profession, which of late years has been legally recognized as a distinct school of medicine.—St. Louis Republic.
