Reno, Nev., July 21—The Humphrey Hotel at Susanville in Lassen County Cal., caught fire today and was entirely destroyed. With the exception of two children, a daughter of Mrs. Laparry and a son of Mr. and Mrs. K. R. Miller, the occupants, escaped. The children were burned to death.

There was but little insurance on the building and the loss cannot be estimated.

Not The Bandit

Denver, July 21—Positive proof that the train robber who was killed on Divide Creek, June 9 last, was not the notorious bandit, Harvey Logan has been secured by an examination of the body by Dr. R. K. MacAlester. The convincing mark of identification on which the detectives relied was a scar on the right wrist caused by a gunshot wound, known to have been inflicted several years ago on Logan. The dead man's wrist bears no such marks.

Banner Year

Presiding Elder C E Gibson of the Walla Walla district of the Columbia River Conference of the Methodist Church was a pleasant visitor at our office this morning and in response to the question as to the general work under his supervision replied, that this was the banner year for his district and the reports to the general conference would show that the Walla Walla district this year would not only show a greater gain but would show the greatest gain of any in the history of the conferences within the Columbia River Conference. During the year \$100,000 had been spent in the building of churches and \$8000 for parsonages and that the improvements were substantial and permanent the average cost of the new churches built was in the neighborhood of \$10,000. The membership is rapidly increasing both from accessions to the church and from immigration, and now reaches 3500 in his district.

Let Him Alone

Olympia, Wash., July 21—Clarence Harmer, a 16 year old boy, of Rainier was accidentally shot and severely injured last night by a young Italian, whom Harmer and other Rainier boys had been teasing. The Italian had no intention of shooting the boy, as he pointed the gun at Harmer and pulled the trigger not knowing it was loaded. The full charge of bird shot struck Harmer in the groin.

The boys had been playing with the gun for some time snapping the hammers down several times without effect. Harmer is at St Peter's Hospital this city, and will doubtless recover.
