Japan Protests

St Petersburg July 26—The admiral, according to excellent information, is preparing a statement regarding the vessels of the volunteer fleet, which will be published in the Official Messenger tomorrow.

It is rumored Japanese officials protested to the Russian government against violation of the rules of war on 11 counts, namely: Several Russian battalions hoisting the white flag at the battle of Valangow and including the Japanese flag; abuse of the Red Cross flag; stabbing, shooting and mutilating the wounded, etc., ascertained in General Oku's report already published.

MOK CARBOLIC ACID ROUTE

Boise Idaho, July 26—Apparently for no reason beyond the fact that he had been felled in his third attempt to run away from home, Joe Robertson, the 12 year old son of Mr and Mrs J J Robertson, who reside on the bench about six miles from the city, drank the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid about 10 o'clock Sunday morning dying from the effects within a half hour. That he drank it with suicidal intent seems apparent to those familiar with the facts and was the verdict of the coroner's jury empaneled yesterday afternoon by Coroner Lee.

Desperate Battle

London, July 26—Cabling July 24 the Mail's Nui Chwang correspondent describes a fourteen hours battle with heavy losses on both sides and which resulted in the Russian position at Ta Tohe being rendered untenable by reason of which they will be compelled to retreat towards Hsiehcheng.

The battle began at 6 o'clock in the morning, the Russians resuming the attack on the Japanese position on the height east of Ta Tohe Kiao. After a few hours the Japanese compelled the Russians to retreat to Tienghu-teun, six miles from their base.

The Russians, now reinforced, maintained their position until 5 p m when the Japanese flank made a sudden appearance on the hills south of Ta Tohe Kiao and by a tremendous fire forced the Russians to retreat.

After two more hours of incessant storm of shot and shell they saw at the hill and plain clear of Russians

Two Died For Boy.

Paris, July 25.—Albert Loret, a 6 year-old boy, of Lille, who was this week run over and taken to the hospital caused the death of two men. One of these men was recently drowned in the River Scarpe, in saving the boy, who had fallen into the water, and the other lost his life by falling from the third-story window of a burning house in an attempt to save him.

Buried in Ground

Oregon City, Or., July 24—Lottie Wilson, age 8 years, of Damascus, this county met with a distressing accident yesterday. Falling from a horse she sustained a serious fracture of her left arm. The fracture was not only thrown from the socket, but the bone was thrust through the flesh of the arm the girls lies and into the ground.

The patient was brought to this city for treatment and the attending physician fears that blood poisoning will result from the injury.
